the superintendent has this to say: "There is more wheat on the main line from Kenesaw to McCook and on the Imperial branch than last year. From Hastings to Red Cloud I estimate the yield at twenty-five to thirty bushels per acre and from Red Cloud to Oxford fifteen to twenty bushels.

"On the Oberlin branch in Kansas the yield will be five to eight bushels and about the same on the St. Francis branch. It is hard to say what the average crop is on the Kansas branches of the McCook division.

"Oats, which constitute the principal crop of spring grain, have suffered considerable from lack of moisture and it is doubtful if there will be more than an average crop." Corn Condition Improves.
