NEW YORK, July 10.—Both at home and abroad there was an improvement today in conditions affecting stock market values. The betterment was sufficiently pronounced to find reflection in price movements, although tha low point to which trading had fallen and the absence of outside interest in the market procluded an extended advance. During the first hour of the day there was a brisk demand and prices rose smartly. Canadian Pacific, yesterday's weak feature, bounded up 1% and Union Pacific nearly as much. Other prominent mediums of speculation rose a point or more. The demand soon fell off, however, and prices reacted. The market came to a standatill on the downward swing and during the remainder of the session changes were small. The list dipped downward again shortly before the close, but part of the day's advance was retained in-most cases.

The action taken by President Wilson, in the hope of averting a strike of conductors and trainmen on the eastern railroads, was rated as the most important influence on the constructive side of the market. Encouragement was derived also from Scoretary McAdoo's statement that the government is per cent bonds, which have recently sold below par for the first time, would be protected by means of changes in the currency bill. The extension lately of the short interest made possible a drive at the bears and this was largely responsible for the swiftness of the early rise.

Although the monthly statement of the united States Steel corporation showed a falling off, in unfilled orders of 517,000 tons, bringing back the amount to the smallest in a year, the showing was well in line with expectations and exercised no influence on the market. 

Watching the Crop. Reports coming to Burlington headquarters indicate that the wheat yield throughout the South Platte country is much greater than was predicted by the most optimistic farmers and elevator men. It is conceded that from Red Willow and Frontier counties, west, the wheat crop is light, but the quality is excellent.

East of these counties, the yield begins to rapidly increase, growing better all the way through to the Missouri river. Burlington agents in Webster county report some wonderful yields. In several fields in this county where threshing has been done, wheat has turned out from twenty-five to thirty-six bushels per acre, the grain weighing as high as sixty-

In Kearney county, which this season has been considered a portion of the dry belt, Burlington agents report an average yield of fifteen bushels, while many of the fields are running much higher.

Coming still farther east, in Gage county, the yield up to this time shows an average of thirty bushels. In Pawnee county reports from half a dozen of the stations indicate a yield running from twenty-seven to thirty-two bushels. the grain testing sixty-one to sixty-three pounds per bushel.

Of the countles from which reports have been made to the Burlington, Richardson, n the extreme southeast corner of the from two fields west of Falls City give twenty and twenty-two bushels, respec-tively, while one to the south is forty-two and one-half bushels. Two fields west of town show a yield of thirty and thirtyturned out twenty-two and thirty-two bushels, respectively, all of the grain testing sixty-three pounds per bushel.
