BONDHOLDERS GO INTO COURT Westthy Farmers Have Confessed Judgment for Three Hundred

> Thousand Dollars on Endorsed Notes.

The lows & Omehn Short Line Stallroad company was placed in the hands of a receiver yesterday by an order issued by Judge Wheeler in the district court in Council Bluffs. August F. Dammrow, cashier of the Treynor bank. was made receiver and directed to immediately take possession of all of the company's property. The receiver was asked for by the bondholders, who hold all of the lesue of first mortgage bonds, approximating \$150,000.

The fact that it has been found to be impractical to operate the road for the last week or more and that a bend of only \$10,000 was required to be filed by the receiver, indicates the great degreciation of the property. The bondholders include the wealthy farmers who have confessed judgment in the district court for nearly \$200,000 upon notes endorsed by them to pay for the construction of the road, which runs from Council Bluffs to Treynor, a distance of twelva

When the farmers secured loans practically 2000,000 to take up part of their paper the entire bond issue was in their possession, given as security at the time the endorsed paper was given. The bonds bear date of June 10, 1909, and are in series of 200 of 2000 each. To secure their payment a trust deed covering all of the property of the road was given to John J. Spindler and Ernest E. Hart as trustees. Following Mr. Hart's death August F. Dammrow was selected to fill the vacancy. The suit for a re-ceiver by Spindler and Dammrow is at the direction of ten other bondholders and heavy creditors, all residing near the riliage of Treynor. The Lara Construction company, W. M. Lana and George W. Adams are made defendants with the Short Lipe company.

The other plaintiffs are William Treds.

William Huss, B. Volken, P. N. Bucks-dorf, Pater Kathmann, Mrs. August Olderog, Arthur E. Saar, Thomas Flood. A. L. Ingram and J. Hersch. They ask judgment for \$175,000 and interest and costs. The bonds were to draw 6 per cent interest and to be payable in 1911. As the read has never made operating expenses no interest was ever paid.


