Lynch Criticises Abbreviated Game

NEW YORK, July 11.—President Lynch of the National league, in refusing to uphold the protest filed by the Chicago club in the game with St. Louis, Sunday, July 6, denounces the practice of team managers entering into agreements to stop play at certain hours in order to catch early trains. He said: "This practice has grown into an abuse, grossly unfair to the public and in violation of the spirit of the playing rules. Umpires will hereafter observe no agreement of such nature, except it be absolutely necessary in order to allow one hour to catch the last train by means of which either team can reach next scheduled point on time."
