The Three Dissents.

Three of the fifteen members of the home rule charter convention have dissented from the draft finally approved by the other chartermakers. What is noteworthy about this is, not that there are three dissenting members, but that the dissent is in each case explained by ascribing a different and contradic-

Pailure to concur is explained at length by one of the dissenters on the ground that the proposed charter gives Omaha the full measure of home rule instead of vesting in a nonresident governor the administration of one branch of our local affairs, and does not go far enough in restricting the liquor traffic.

Another member explains that in his opinion the charter does not assume broad enough powers of home rule, and puts too many restrictions on the liquor traffic,

The third member lets it be known that he is merely carrying out orders from the officers of the Central Labor union, whose demands he voiced in the convention, because all those demands were not complied with.

We submit that the explanations for the three dissents, taken together and in connection with the contents of the proposed charter, offer the reasons given must commend the charter to all taxpayers and voters of the community who have no special from in the fire, but want a progressive, efficient and controllable city government-controlled by them, themselves, rather than by a egislature and governor at Lincoln.
