Cable news aided the favorable reports from the northwest in upsetting the wheat buils. The world's available supply was shown to be a million hushels larger than a year ago, export inquiry was slow, and receipts rapidly increased. No ground for a rally could be discovered and in the last hour bearish sentiment was practically unchecked.

Despite an advance due to scorching and drought southwest corn prices eventually suffered a decline. Mainly, the cause appeared to be the freedom with which prominent longs undertook to realize prifits.

Oats were depressed by the weakness of corn and wheat and by heavy speculative selling, based on improved crop advices from states of largest production. Provisions rose moderately with hoge milwaukee packers, however, unloading on the advance, wiped out most of the gains.
