Four Men Form Chain from Iron Fence Into Current and Effect Resenc-One Takes a

NIAGARA PALLS, N. T., July 19. Truman Chapman, 32 years old, of Hamilton, Ont., was rescued from the brink of American falls tonight by four men, one of whom took a desperate chance to reach him. Chapman was sitting on the iron railing just above Prospect point and was seen suddenly to topple backwards into the stream.

At this point the current is swift and the pull toward the brink of the falls, fifteen feet away, almost trresistible. After striking the water Chapman's body lodged against two projections of rock and this undoubtedly saved him from almost instant death.


