Ned Allis Beats Chick Evans, Four Up, with Three to Go

CHICAGO, July 24 .- "Ned" Allis, Milwaukee's star golfer, was three up on Champion "Chick" Evans at the end of the first eighteen holes of the third round of the western amateur championship at Homewood today.

Evans was not up to his usual great game, and especially in putting and his half iron work, but Allia' play was sensational at times. The champion apparently was disconcerted by the unexpected opposition which the youthful Milwaukeean presented to his march to 1913 honors, and disappointed his supporters among the hundreds in the gallery.

Allia' play on the fourth hole was one of the features of the tournament. At that stage when stymied a few inches from the hole Allis drove the Champion's ball beyond the cup and dropped his own into it. On the eighteenth Evans missed a thirty-foot putt by a few inches. Allis was six up after twenty-three holes. He won four of the first five in the afternoon round. E. P. Allis of Milwaukee today elimi-

nated Champion Chick Evans from the western amateur golf championship in the tournament at Homewood. Allis won the match 4 up and 2 to go.
