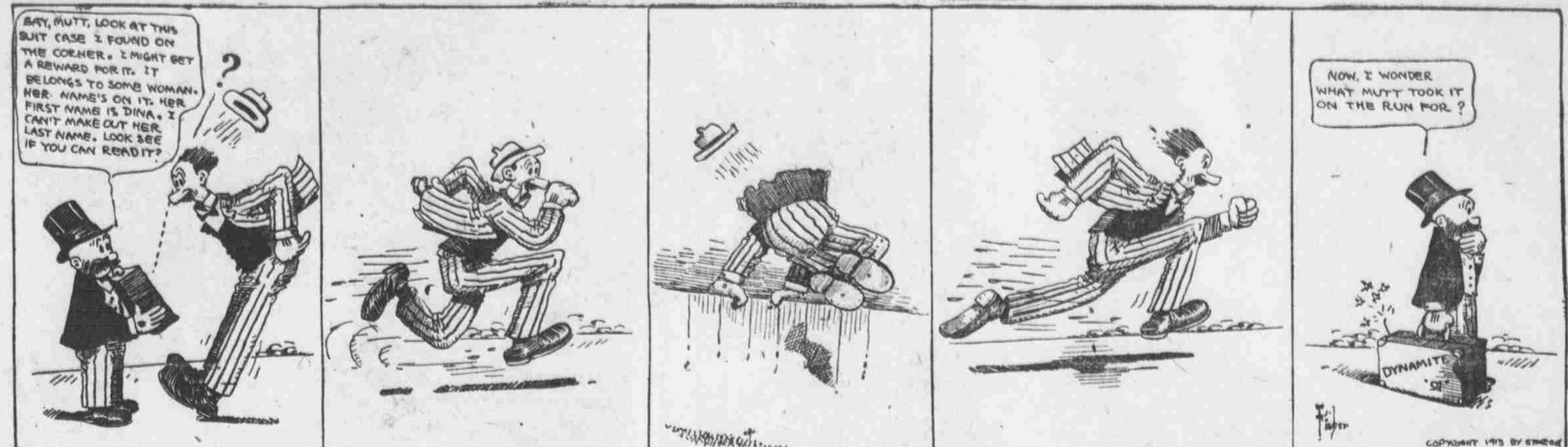

Ned Allis Beats Chick Evans, Four Up, with Three to Go

CHICAGO, July 24.—Ned Allis, Milwaukee's star golfer, was three up on Champion Chick Evans at the end of the first eighteen holes of the third round of the western amateur championship at Homewood today.

Evans was not up to his usual great game, and especially in putting and his half iron work, but Allis' play was sensational at times. The champion apparently was disconcerted by the unexpected opposition which the youthful Milwaukeean presented to his march to 1913 honors, and disappointed his supporters among the hundreds in the gallery.

Allis' play on the fourth hole was one of the features of the tournament. At that stage when stymied a few inches from the hole Allis drove the champion's ball beyond the cup and dropped his own into it. On the eighteenth Evans missed a thirty-foot putt by a few inches. Allis was six up after twenty-three holes. He won four of the first five in the afternoon round.

E. P. Allis of Milwaukee today eliminated Champion Chick Evans from the western amateur golf championship in the tournament at Homewood. Allis won the match 4 up and 3 to go.

NOT A GAME IN THE MAJORS

Four Slated in National, but Only One Even Started.

NONE SCHEDULED IN AMERICAN

Bash Contests in East Are Also Remarkable for Their Rarity—Pitchers Leave New York Without Single Victory.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Not since the season's early weeks has such a base ball hiatus occurred as that of today, when not a single major league game was played and minor league contests in the east were conspicuous for their rarity. It was an off day anyway for the American league, the western teams being on their way east to open new series tomorrow. Four games were scheduled in the National league, but rain prevented all of them, as it did numerous minor organization engagements on the day's program.

So general was the rain in major league eastern territory that no attempts were made to start games in New York, Brooklyn and Philadelphia, while in Boston the Braves and the Reds had played less than an inning when the downpour came. It was the last day of the current series in each city and in consequence double-headers are likely to be arranged during the next eastern invasion of the western continent.

Leave Without a Win. Pittsburgh had to leave New York without a single victory, the Giants having taken three straight. In Boston, Cincinnati took two out of three, while Chicago had to content with one in three in Philadelphia. Brooklyn and St. Louis divided the two games played in the former city.

The eastern clubs in the National are on their way west tonight, but only one game—Philadelphia at Pittsburgh—is scheduled for tomorrow. In the American league Chicago will open in Boston, Cleveland in New York, St. Louis in Washington and Detroit in Philadelphia.

ACREAGE OF RYE THIRD GREATER THAN YEAR AGO. (From a Staff Correspondent.)
