

OMAHANS ARE ELIMINATED

Last Two Representatives Succumb in Clay Court Tournament.

LARMON PUTS UP STIFF FIGHT

White Strachan, Californian Crack, Defeated Him, He Had to Do Some Hustling to Achieve His Success.

Succumbing to the superior playing of visitors, Omaha's last two representatives in the national clay court tournament were Thursday eliminated in the race for the national championship. Cub Potter was easy pickings for Fred Harris and Russell Larmon was no match for Johnny Strachan.

Russell Larmon played an excellent game of tennis against the western champion, considering his youth and inexperience. Larmon, although he only took two games, made the Californian lag for every point and on several occasions placed the ball so accurately that Strachan was unable to return.

Best Match of All. The best match of the afternoon was the match between Armstrong and Hall. Armstrong beat Hall last year in the clay court tournament at Pittsburgh and the easterner was determined to have his revenge this year.

Griffin beats Jones. Clarence Griffin handily beat Drummond Jones, the St. Louis player, 6-2, 6-2. Jones, with his slow, easy-going style of play, could not compete against the westerner's fast smashing game.

Final Doubles Today. Strachan and Griffin will play Hall and Harris in the final round of the doubles today by virtue of the double victory of yesterday over Branson and Young and Hoer and Jones, respectively.

Griffin was decidedly off his game in the doubles match and would repeatedly drive the ball outside or into the net on returns. Whenever he tried close placement at the sides or corners of the court, the ball was sure to fall just outside the line.

Harris played a wonderful net game. It was seemingly impossible to get the ball past him, no matter how hard it was hit or how close to the net.

The match between Kennedy and Madden and Griffin and Strachan on the adjoining court was so much for the mixed team to overcome. Hoer and Jones were not even pushed to win.

Hall and Harris, the eastern team, took Beyer and Sweet from Iowa into camp so easily that they played each other in a singles match to make up for the deficiency in exercise.

Consolations Played. Several matches in the consolation, both singles and doubles, were played. Omaha players are monopolizing those two events, Sweet of Des Moines being the only visiting player remaining.

Today the finals in the doubles will be played and also the semi-finals in the singles. Hall and Harris will play Griffin and Strachan in the doubles and Hall will play Griffin and Harris will play Strachan in the semi-finals of the singles.

The two women's champions, Miss Brown and Mrs. Williams, will play several matches this afternoon also. A singles match against each other had been arranged and a mixed doubles match pitted with the Californians or Koch and Potter will comprise the other match.
