

DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Despit Midsummer Pause, Volume of Transactions Continues Large.

CONFIDENCE FULLY SUSTAINED

Aggregate of Foreign Commerce for Last Week Smaller Than for Same Period of Preceding Two Years.

NEW YORK, July 25.—Dun's Review to-morrow will say:

There is the customary mid-summer pause in mercantile and industrial activity; yet the volume of transactions continue large and confidence is fully sustained.

The aggregate of foreign commerce for the latest week reported was smaller than for the same period of the two years immediately preceding, the decline being due entirely to a falling off in merchandise exports.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW

Crop News More Favorable—Iron and Steel Better.

NEW YORK, July 25.—Bradstreet's to-morrow will say:

Crop news, due to beneficial rains, is more favorable, feeling in iron and steel markets is better, money does not appear to be so tight, the stock market reflects a rather bullish sentiment, favorable weather has helped retail distribution, railway traffic is enlarging, and conservative optimism seems to be spreading.

On the other hand trade with wholesale dealers and jobbers reflects more or less irregularity, the iron and steel industry may be attributed to midsummer conditions, to restrictions imposed by high rates for money and to tariff uncertainty.

While the stock market does not manifest much activity the undertone is stronger and realizing sales are quite readily absorbed.

Business failures for the week ending July 25 were 24 which compares with 23 in 1912.

Wheat, including flour exports from the United States and Canada for the week ending July 24, Galveston not reported, aggregate 3,830,000 bushels against 2,000,000 bushels last year.
