EXAMINE REFORMATORY SITE

Members of Board of Control Will Make Trip Over State.

MANY TOWNS APPLY FOR PLACE

President Holcomb Anxious to Locate New Institution Where Opportunity Will Be Offered to Manufacture Brick.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 10.—(Special.)—Members of the State Board of Control are getting ready to make personal examination and investigation of the offers made and the sites proposed by the several towns which have put in bids for the location of the new \$1,000,000 reformatory voted by the last legislature.

The following towns have made application for the location and have made offers of land, buildings and other inducements to convince the board that it would be carrying out the best interests of the state to locate the institution therein:

- Alma, Neligh; Aurora, Plattsmouth; Columbus, Ravenna; Crete, Red Cloud; Geneva, Rock; Holdrege, Superior; Humboldt, Table Rock; Kearney, Tekamah; Lincoln, Wahoo; Loup City, Wayne; Minden, ...

Some of these towns have made offers for buildings already erected. Kearney offering the old cotton mill, while Lincoln offers the present Nebraska Military academy building. Others are offering brick yards, Table Rock, Wahoo, Humboldt and a few others appearing in that list, while others simply offer land, much of it adapted to the making of brick.

Look for Brick Making Site. It is understood that some of the members of the board, principally President Holcomb, favor a location where the inmates of the institution can be employed in making brick, but it is not known to what extent the other members concur in his opinion.

As the trip practically covers all sections of the state with the exception of the west and northwest, it will take some time to make the investigations and it is not likely that any conclusion will be reached immediately.

Water Power Expenditures. Reports from the different water power projects disclose that there has not been much done in the way of building and improving during the month of February.

C. W. Baker for the Kirk filling reports an outlay of only \$51 and a like amount for the Burnham filling.

The Nebraska Power company expended \$5 cash last month, but reports that the money spent to build intake and head came from the proceeds of the \$50,000 bond issue.

Charles P. Ross reports an expenditure of \$425.

Fair Company Incorporates.

The Fair Merchandise company of Omaha has filed its articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, showing a capital stock of \$10,000. The incorporators are Meyer Freidel, Laura Adler and Charles L. Fritscher.

John G. Maher Says Led Exhuming Band

LINCOLN, March 10.—(Special.)—Investigation of the incidents leading to the recovery of the body of Clemente Vergara from a Mexican cemetery, discloses that Colonel John G. Maher, the hero of many a typewritten engagement during the Spanish-American war, was a leading spirit. Colonel Maher is near the Mexican line. A few days ago he was arrested as a suspect, but turned loose because of his ability to convince the Mexicans that he was innocent of any wrong doing.

Immediately after his release according to a letter received today, he returned to the American side and organized an expedition to go to the graveyard where the body of Vergara was buried and recovered the same. A Mexican acquainted with the spot and who knew which grave contained the body was pressed into service, and on Saturday night Colonel Maher, a man called Bill Pratt, another by the name of C. S. Sazby and three Mexicans, crossed the river and unmolested reached the cemetery five miles distant, where they soon exhumed the body and were successful in getting it across the border early Sunday morning.

Information as to the expedition came to the office of Governor Morehead this morning in a letter from Colonel Maher himself who simply relates the incident giving the names of the parties who assisted him in the expedition.

New Pumping Plant at Beatrice Placed in Commission Monday

BEATRICE, Neb., March 10.—(Special.)—The long looked for solution of the water problem in this city has at last been solved, as Monday the spring water was turned into the mains and the city freed from dependencies upon the Blue river as a source of water supply. One pump of a million-gallon capacity was started, and the other pump of a million and a half gallons capacity will be lowered into the well, while the water is kept down by the smaller pump. For the first two hours the water was allowed to run through the line into the big well at the pumping station in order to clean out the pipe. It was turned into the system, which supplies the city with water. The old Holly pumps, which have drawn water from the river for twenty-five years, were shut down, and it is expected that they will be used no longer except for emergency. The city's water supply is obtained from Zimmerman springs, two miles northwest of the city.

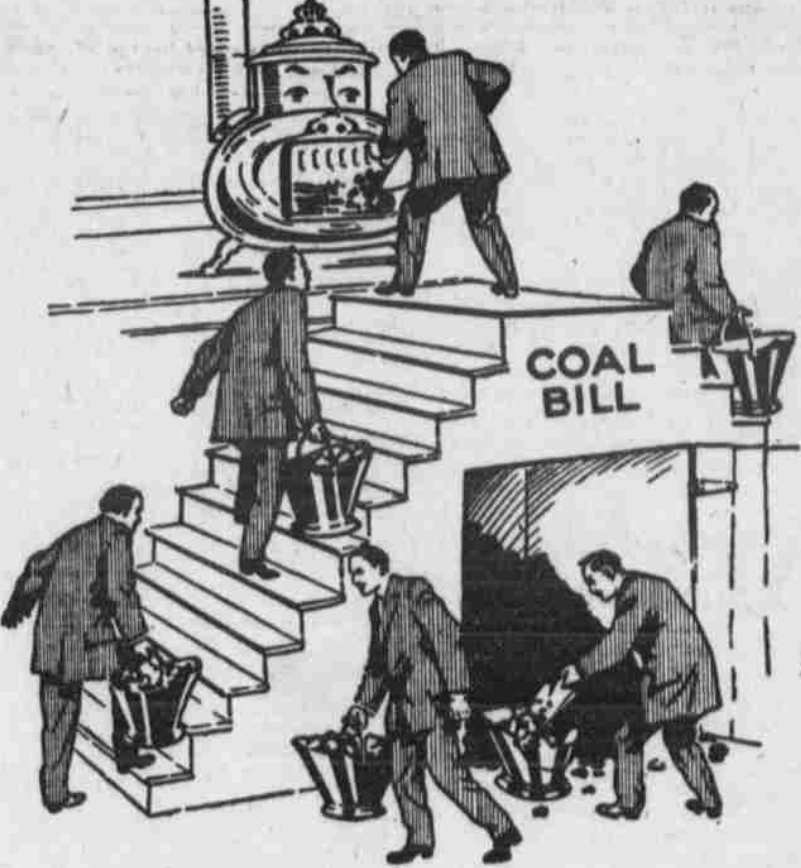
