Feds Begin Campaign to Get Players Under Contract with Majors

CHICAGO, March 10.—The Federal league has already begun its campaign to get players now under contract with the American and National leagues, according to today's dispatches from southern training camps. Manager George Stovall of the Kansas City Federals was reported at Tampa and St. Petersburg, the neighboring Florida camps of the Chicago Nationals and St. Louis Americans, and admitted that he was after players.

From the Chicago Federals' training ground at Shreveport came word that four members of the Boston Americans—two pitchers, a third baseman and a shortstop—had sent a telegram to President Gilmore asking for terms. Another story from Shreveport said that Grover Alexander, pitcher for the Philadelphia Nationals, has applied for a place in the new league.

TWO LEAGUES IN THE CITY

Twin City and City League Are Put Under Way.

SCHEDULE COMMITTEES NAMED

Park Commissioner Will Provide Diamonds and Other Games Will Be Played in Krug Park and Finmore.

At another meeting of the class B amateur base ball league at the city hall last night, steps were taken toward preparation of a schedule for the season's play. President J. J. Isaacson of the league and the managers of the eighteen teams in the association and several players attended the meeting.

This league was divided into two minor leagues—the Twin City league and the City league—the former of eight teams and the latter of ten. The Twin City teams will play in Krug park and in a park in Florence. The City league will battle in the five Omaha city parks to be opened to them by the park commissioner.

Herman Grossman was elected president and Roger Kelly secretary of the Twin City league. E. Adams and Robert Kroll were elected president and secretary, respectively, of the City league. Schedule committees were named as follows, to act with the presidents of the leagues: Twin City League—George E. Graham, Howard Horne, Roger Kelly and John Trotter.

City League—Robert Kroll, G. O. Gautier, Anton Gerhardt and Dick Shannon.

As soon as the schedules are arranged the committee will ask the park commissioner to approve the same and issue permits for the games to be played in the city parks during the summer.

Later the details of the season's work will be figured out. As the work gets under way it is planned to make a ruling against players jumping from one league to another.

Indianapolis Feds Begin Trip South

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 10.—Fourteen players, including Manager William Phillips of the Indianapolis Federal league team departed this afternoon for their spring training camp at Wichita Falls, Tex. PARENTS SADLY NEGLECTFUL

T. F. Sturges Addresses Woman's Club on Where to Place Blame.

TOO MUCH LEFT TO OTHERS

Fathers and Mothers, Instead of Looking After Own Young, Expect Outsiders to Shoulder Responsibility.

"We have reached the acme of social riot in dance and dress. Parents today depend on legislation, social service boards and schools to do what the father and mother ought to do. Sex hygiene is taught in schools, white slavery on the stage, and the home life sadly neglected and broken up." These were the statements of T. F. Sturges, of the Social Service board, in his talk before the Omaha women's club Monday afternoon.

Mr. Sturges attached the responsibility for these evils on newspapers, for giving these items publicity; dancing masters for using these as an advertising medium and drawing card, and parents for neglecting their duty because of commercial and social interests.

Pa Rourke Has Park All Ready for the Spring Training

Verdiot is Fairman Killed by a Train

CHICAGO, March 10.—Casius M. Fairman, the Oak Park business man, whose body was found on the Chicago & North-western railroad track a week ago, was killed by the train, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury which conducted the inquest tonight.

The jury failed to account for Fairman's presence in West Chicago, where the body was found. He was killed after he had announced that he intended to start that night for Omaha to visit his fiancée.

The police aired a theory at the inquest that Fairman had known and visited a woman in Oak Park after announcing that he had left for Omaha. Railroad detectives expressed their belief that Fairman was dead before placed on the tracks.

The evidence of those who discovered the body showed that the body was nude when found and that the vest, coat and underwear were found undamaged some 300 feet from the body.

REPUTED SLAYER OF ELEVEN, FEUDIST DIES OF PNEUMONIA

MIDDLESBORO, March 10.—General Souders, leader of the Souders' faction in the famous Souders-Turner feud, which was supposed to have ended twenty-five years ago, died at his home today of pneumonia. He was 53 years old, and is reputed to have killed eleven men. He prided himself, however, on his having been, for the last twenty years, a law-abiding citizen.

Endorse Social Service Board.

The social science department endorsed the recommendation of the Social Service board made to the city commission recently, that a survey committee composed of the managing editors of each of the daily newspapers, and sufficient other members to give a fair representation of every department of the city life, be appointed to look into the matter of the city's needs and lay the facts before the city commission for action.

Mr. Sturges spoke of the determination of the Social Service board to prevent plays such as "The Traffic" from being produced in Omaha, and also of the plan of the board working in conjunction with the moving picture houses for special matinees when the programs will be presented with a special view as to what is good for children.

Kugel Gives His Views.

That pool halls, chop-uey parlors and drug stores were worse offenders against the law than the saloon-keepers was the opinion of Police Commissioner Kugel, the other speaker of the afternoon. Mr. Kugel went on to state that home brewers were co-operating with him in the enforcement of the "8 o'clock" law, but that the outside brewers were hard to handle. The commissioner heavily scored parents for the conduct of children and stated that fathers could do a great deal to mitigate the pool-hall evil amongst their boys.

Insufficient number of policemen, need for a new police station, and the urgent necessity for the state to provide a workhouse or work-place which should include a home for women were urged by him.

Preceding the speakers, Mrs. Frances Follansbee, head of the department, read a paper on the relative meaning of the feminist movement and the "healthy baby" movement, dealing with eugenics and universal motherhood.
