

AGRICULTURAL CLUBS BUSY

Nebraska Boys and Girls Join for Practical Instruction.

YIELD AND EXPENSE RECORDED

Nebraska College of Agriculture Co-operates with Government Department in Promoting Organization's Work.

The extension service of Nebraska College of Agriculture co-operates with the United States Department of Agriculture in promoting boys' and girls' club work. The purpose of this extension activity is to interest boys and girls in agriculture and domestic science and to develop a lasting and practical knowledge and interest in farm and home problems.

19 and 19 years are enrolled in these clubs. The corn, potato, gardening, cooking and sewing clubs represent the lines of work particularly emphasized in Nebraska this year. Boys and girls may enroll in one or more of these clubs and put forth special effort to carry out the work outlined for that particular club. In the gardening and field work the club member must keep a record of his work and expenses connected with his crop, and then determine his profit. Lessons, prepared by instructors in the college of agriculture are sent to club members each month. These serve as a basis for study and investigation.

In communities where a number of boys or girls are following the same line of work, a club is organized. The club members then meet once or twice a month to compare, discuss and study their work.

Annual local, county, state and national contests are held, where club members exhibit their products or articles made in the club work. Winners in

these contests are given premiums of some recognition for achievement.

Fifteen-hundred Nebraska boys and girls are enrolled in the club work at this time and an enrollment does not close before June 1, many more will enter the game. This work is not only creating a greater interest in subjects vital to the home and the agricultural interests of our state, but it is also raising standards of production. Thirty members of the Boys' Corn club of 1913 had a yield of more than fifty bushels of corn on their acre.

Quinn Drags the Coin.
Pitcher Jack Quinn of the Boston Nationals signed a contract with the Baltimore Federal League club. Quinn went to Boston from the Rochester International team at the close of last season. Quinn signed a contract drawn up by L. Edwin Goldman, and it was not different from the regular league document in any important sense. The pitcher carried back to his home in Pottstown, Pa., \$5,000 in advance money.

Enforcement of New Iowa Law Enjoined in Federal Court

Judge Smith McPherson of the federal court, sitting in Council Bluffs, issued a restraining order to prevent the enforcement of the Iowa law requiring sterilization of criminals.

Hudolph Davis, a convict from Linn county, serving ten years for burglary in the Fort Madison penitentiary, is the plaintiff in the proceedings, and declares his last reason to believe the prison authorities are about to perform the operation of sterilization on him. William H. Berry, John E. Howe and David C. Mott, constituting the state board of parole; Warden J. Sanders and Dr. Austin A. Philipott, prison physician, are named as defendants.

Davis charges that the law, which

was passed by the last legislature, is unconstitutional in that it proposes to inflict punishment without judicial trial, and that it does not apply equally to all persons, but affects only those within state penal institutions, and that otherwise it is in conflict with established laws.

MONEY TO THE AMOUNT OF \$20,000 FOR NEW ART HOME

The sum of \$20,000 for the new Art Home building fund was pledged at a meeting of the campaign committee of the Omaha Society of Fine Arts, Tuesday afternoon. A prospectus was issued, outlining the proposed organization. The grades of memberships are designated by benefactors, subscribers of \$5.00 or more; patrons, subscribers of \$10.00 or more; perpetual, those giving \$50 or more; life, those giving \$100 or more; honorary, those paying no dues; and sustaining, active and annual members at yearly dues of \$10, \$5 and \$1, respectively.
