BLUFFS MAKES GOOD SHOW

Federal Report Reveals It in Most Favorable Light.

COMPARED WITH OTHER CITIES

Per Capita Debt is Less Than Average for Seventy-Six Cities of the Same Class, and Other Figures Show Well.

City Auditor McAnaney is highly pleased over the showing made by the federal statistical reports of seventy-six cities, each with a population of more than 20,000.

Of the \$22,92, the water works bonds represented \$10,54, the schools \$6.58 and all the other city bonds and financial obligations only \$5.80.

As security for this gross debt of \$209,093, is \$2,320,516 worth of property, represented by the value of the water plant, \$738,000; the city park property, exclusive of the new Dodge park, \$378,000; city school property, \$433,000; public library, \$174,000; fire department property, \$119,000; police department property, \$22,500; and other property, including city buildings, detention hospital, street and sewer departments, aggregating the more than \$2,250,000.

In another feature of the report Council Bluffs makes a record that leads all of the other cities. The average daily attendance of school children for the year covered by the report, 1912, was 4,969. The total average number of school children attending the schools in all of the seventy-six cities for the year was 289,478, an average of 5,256 children attending schools in each of the cities.

Mayor Maloney first explained the object of the meeting, being followed by E. E. Spelman, who presented a huge map of the city and pointed out a feasible location. Robert Wallace, of the Commercial club, made an excellent speech and was followed by E. J. McVann, who spoke for nearly an hour and made a fine impression.

Some Change Shown By Official Figures

The election books and ballot boxes used in the school election on Monday were not all delivered at the office of Secretary J. J. Hughes until an early hour yesterday morning, and the figures taken directly from the covers of the envelopes show some changes. The proposition to vote \$25,000 taxes to erect an addition to the Madison avenue school building was defeated by eighteen votes, but all the other propositions carried.

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Fight Pistol Duel to Death in a Crowded Car of Moving Train

WELSH, W. Va., March 11.—It is Taylor, a deputy sheriff, is dead, A. D. Beavers, a former United States deputy marshal, is dying, and D. W. Beavers, a deputy sheriff, and T. E. Hickey, are seriously wounded as the result of a pistol battle on a Norfolk and Western train today between Lager and Berwind, W. Va.

It is said that the shooting followed a quarrel between Taylor and the Beavers brothers. Taylor was shot five times and instantly killed. A. D. Beavers received a bullet in the abdomen, his brother was shot through the leg, and Hickey, who had no part in the fight, received a thigh wound.

All the parties to the battle are prominent and well known as officials in the coal fields. The car in which the shooting occurred was crowded with passengers, but the duellists shot true to their aim, only one noncombatant being hurt.
