

DUN'S REPORT OF FAILURES FOR FEBRUARY

While R. G. DUN & Co. reported 51 more commercial failures in the United States during February than in the corresponding period of the year immediately preceding, the liabilities, on the other hand, shows a material decrease as compared with that time. Total insolvencies last month numbered 1,505 and supplied \$22,-\$54,193 of defaulted indebtedness against 1,454 in February, 1913, when the amount involved was no less than \$28,141,258... Carrying the record back still further, it is seen that two years ago 1,539 bustness reverses occurred for the sum of \$21,477,928; in 1911 there were 1,191 suspensions for \$17,086,471 and in 1910 only 1,087 concerns failed, although the aggregate debts exceeded \$27,400,000. As is invariably the case in the second mont's of the year, the mercantile and industrial mortality of the country reflected a considerable reduction from the returns of January : in fact, there were 352 fewer defaults than in the earlier month and the liabilities were smaller by fully \$17,000,-000. In contrast with a year ago, the best exhibit was made by the manufacturing division is so fr. as the indebtedness was concerned, a total of \$6,335,413 comparing with \$14,172,504; but numerically the showing was adverse, since 374 insolven-cies were reported against 340 last year. In trading occupations the number was practically the same in each instance-1,068 this year against 1,064 in 1913while the amount of money involved was \$11.879,463 against \$13,368,418. Owing to a few defaults of exceptional size, the class embracing agents, prokers and firms of a similar character made a distinctly adverse record, 63 suspensions for \$4,139, 817 comparing with 50 for only \$600.336 in the previous year.
