AFTER PAVING PROMOTERS

Protests Filed by Property Owners in Two Paving Districts.

KIND OF MATERIAL CHANGED

How is Also Stirred Up Over the Petitions Which Were Filed with the City Clerk—One at His Home.

Paving promoters are due for another drubbing at the hands of the city commission, for Commissioner Thomas McGovern's efforts to eliminate them have been futile.

Protests charging promoters with improper action and undue influence in securing signatures have been filed with the council by property owners on Forty-first street from Hamilton to N. 24th and on Templeton from Twenty-fourth to Twenty-seventh street.

Seven affidavits were filed by the Forty-first street residents. These affidavits affirm that the promoter, Thomas S. Crocker, was responsible for changing the nature of material.

City commissioners granted the property owners in street improvement district No. 126 a special hearing for Monday morning.

City attorneys were asked to pass on the Templeton street petition, inasmuch as several petitions were filed, one after the other, and at least five signers appeared on all petitions. It was ruled that some of the petitions were filed too late.

Ungrateful Beggar Robs His Benefactor

James N. McCullian of Chicago, who is stopping at the Paxton hotel, found that his charity to a destitute stranger, with whom he shared his bed, cost him \$24 in money.

Following his dinner at the hotel, McCullian stepped out of the lobby for a little fresh air before retiring. He was approached by a street beggar, a man who told a pitiful story of hard luck, and asked for money to buy food.

The visitor awakes first, and leaving the room without awakening McCullian, made off with \$24 in cash which he found in a wallet in McCullian's pockets.

MAY FACE A MURDER CHARGE

John Sullivan Near Death from Blow Received in Brawl.

GEORGE CLARK ADMITS DEED

Prisoner in Custody of Police After Short Chase Confesses Striking Companion with Piece of Steel Pipe.

As the result of a carousal and fight Wednesday night John Sullivan, 607 1/2 North Sixteenth street, is lying at the point of death at St. Joseph's hospital, while George Clark, Albert Anderson and Emmet Regan, who live at the same address, are being held by the police.

It is the theory of the police that Clark returned to the room after his fellow lodgers had retired and struck Sullivan across the head as he lay sleeping.

The three men, with Emmet Regan, were drinking in the room at 607 1/2 North Seventeenth street Wednesday night, when Clark and Regan started to fight.

Clark then took his belongings and left the place with Anderson. Regan and Sullivan then went to the room which Sullivan had received from the blow.

Yesterday Regan awoke and found Sullivan in a critical condition. The police were notified, and Officer Murphy, accompanied by Dr. C. B. Foltz, police surgeon, went to investigate the case.

Detectives Dunn and Kennelley located Clark, Regan and Anderson in a pool hall at Sixteenth and Cuming streets. Clark saw them coming and ran out of the pool hall and up the stairs of a boarding house nearby.

"I am informed that a grand jury will be ordered for the February term. This offers a method of meeting the situation, and on behalf of the Omaha Bar association I would respectfully request that such persons, laymen and lawyers, as may have information which will lead to the indictment of parties guilty of any form of felony or the compounding of felony in relation to cases brought, suppressed or considered in our courts be brought before the grand jury and there interrogated.

"I wish to assure you that the Omaha Bar association will stand back of you and assist in prosecuting the guilty, if any be found, whether laymen or lawyers, business men or gamblers, Jew or gentiles, whites or blacks.
