

TELLS OF IRISH TROUBLES

Seumas MacManus Talks in Serious Vein at University Club.

LIGHT THROUGH DARK AGES

Until but recently have the Irish been permitted to teach their own tongue to their own people.

It was a serious note that Seumas MacManus struck in his talk at the University club rooms at the luncheon, instead of a funny note as was expected.

"The ancient laws of Ireland were the most beautiful and the most just," he said. "The very poorest man in the land could obtain redress against the king himself, and the man who stole a needle from the poor embroidery woman had to pay a fine many times heavier than the man who stole a similar needle from the queen."

"From the fifth to the tenth century Ireland was the school of Europe. Ireland alone held aloft the torch of light through all the dark ages of Europe. And the renaissance began in Ireland seven centuries before it began in Italy."

Elizabeth and Cromwell. "Then Elizabeth tried to destroy Ireland with sword and fire. Then came Cromwell and swept over the land like a scourge."

The speaker called attention to some of the drastic laws that were enacted by England after this period against Ireland. He said that Irish schoolmasters and clergymen were required to pay heavy fines. In spite of this attempt to crush out learning, he said, such was the desire of the Irish for learning that young men went to France and other parts of Europe in the nineteenth century and gained their education in order that they might come back and teach the Irish. To escape the law against schoolmasters and clergymen, these men taught ragged classes behind the hedge bushes and kept a sentinel on the heights to watch for the soldiers. "It was only in 1829," he said, "that these vicious penal laws were repealed."

Even up to twelve years ago we dared not teach the Irish language in Ireland to Irish pupils. We have recently obtained permission to do this, until today the Irish language is being taught in 3,000 schools to 300,000 Irish pupils. And with the return of the language is coming the return of the Irish spirit."

Ross Hammond Tells Noonday Club of His Job and Income Tax

Ross Hammond, internal revenue collector for Nebraska, was the guest of the Noonday club Friday and after luncheon he told the sixty-five members present some things about the workings of his office and also numerous things about the income tax.

Six years ago, Mr. Hammond asserted, the internal revenue department was a secondary money getter for Uncle Sam, but with the passage of the income tax, which levies an assessment upon 40,000,000 of the 36,000,000 people of the United States, bringing in some \$30,000,000 annually, it has become the big spoke in the wheel.

Mr. Hammond explained that the law is one of the hardest there is to understand and describing its making he ventured the opinion that the author gathered together 10,000 words, mixed them in a hopper and what came out of the mixture was branded an income tax.

In designating who are liable for the tax the speaker pointed to the fact that all corporations come under the ban and that all individuals who have an income of \$2,000, provided they are single, and \$4,000 if they are married, are expected to pay 1 per cent on all income above the sum exempt. One of the peculiarities of the law, he said, was that if a man happens to be married and living with his wife there is an exemption of \$4,000, while if the same parties are living apart each is entitled to an income of \$3,000 that is not taxed. Failure to list property for taxation and claim exemptions, the speaker said, subjected the man or woman who might be taxed to a fine of not less than \$20 and as much as \$100.

In preparing to pay the income tax Mr. Hammond explained that the filing of the report must be made whenever the income reaches \$2,000, regardless of whether the party is married or single. Collector Hammond took the club members into his confidence and explained all the workings of his office, telling how the lists were kept and how collections were made on goods and wares handled by merchants and others and on which a government tax has to be paid.

Before the speaking commenced N. P. Swanson and J. A. It is said that when Fredericksen went away he left the impression that he had gone to look for work at Sioux City, while his wife kept the postoffice. Since then no word has been heard from him and the wife and children are suffering from his absence.

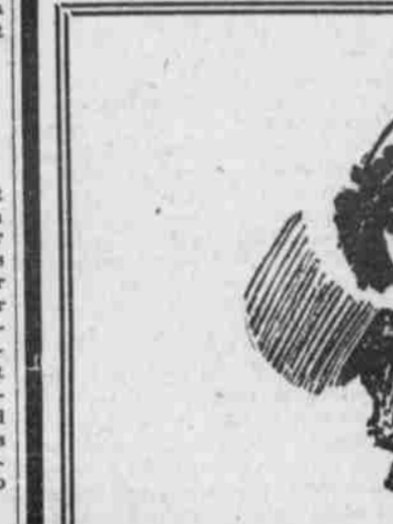
