The young men have left home in search of work, while the aged and the children are left behind to freeze or starve, unless outside relief is brought to them."

A sad story of the famine district is told by the Rev. Chigan Takahashi, a missionary. A tenant in Yubari district, whose wife was starving from starvation and illness, stole a bale of potatogs from his landlord. The wife was grateful for the kindness
