Kennedy and the baby daughter of one of the convention dele gates assembled at the Henshaw hotel yesterday as the guests of the Omaha Suffrage associations. Mrs. Alice Gage Stevenson of Broken Bow, state supervisor for the Royal Neighbors, presides at this meeting and introduced the speak ers, Mrs. Draper Smith, Mrs. Magdalen B. Munson and Mr. Kennedy.

The presiding officer introduced Mr. Kennedy as "a very brave man." He paid a pretty compliment in passing to the earnest women who began their suffrage activities at breakfast and kept

campaign. Reason with the men, and it that don't work coax them. Above all, keep your temper; you've the best of the argument anyway. They say that a woman can't be logical, but I would maten a woman's intuition against man's logs any day in the week. They also tell us that the polls are not fit places for women to go to. If that is so, it is our duty to make them fit. Polling places should be dignified so that there is no danger of contamination from any source, . If we would make fewer laws and enforce more of them we would have a better government."

Mrs. Munson emphasized the need of the "mothering" influence in humanizing government. "Men have fought and died for the right to vote, but it is only necessary for the women of this country to make a united demand for the ballot, and it will be secured, "she said. "The shamrock is the emblem of Ireland. Shall we be accused of holding up the \$1 bill as our emblem?"

Preceding the speeches the delegates were entertained at breakfast and presented with daffodlis, emblem of the suffrage movement, by the Omaha suffrag ists.
