All Churches Prepare for Go-to-Church Day March 29.

WILLIAM BAIRD IN THE PULPIT

Will Speak Sunday Morning at the Love Avenue Presbyterian Church in the Absence of Dr. Nathaniel McGiffin.

All Omaha churches are taking a keen interest in the "Go-to-Church" campaign which is being inaugurated for Sunday, March 29. Every church organization and society in the city is taking active part in the campaign, and instructions are that the largest church attendance in the history of the city will occur on that day.

Dr. Nathaniel McGiffin, pastor of Love Avenue Presbyterian church, is still in the east, where he went some two weeks ago on ecclesiastical matters. His pulpit will be supplied Sunday morning by Mr. William Baird, one of the most prominent attorneys and lawyers of the city. The services will begin as usual at 10:30, Sabbath school following at 12. The other services of the day will be held at the usual time, except that there will be no evening preaching.

The Rev. H. F. Farshall, archdeacon of Duluth, Minn., who was to have spent a week in Omaha and vicinity giving addresses in the Episcopal churches on missionary work among the Indians, has been summoned to Cass Lake, Minn., by the serious illness of his wife's mother. All his Nebraska engagements were cancelled. Archdeacon Farshall was to have spoken at Trinity cathedral Sunday morning, at St. Andrew's in the afternoon and at the Church of the Good Shepherd at night.

Abion Couple Celebrates Golden Wedding

Captain and Mrs. William J. Farris celebrated their golden wedding at Abion, Neb., Tuesday, assisted by Kit Carson post, Grand Army of the Republic, and the women's band. The post presented the couple with many valuable presents. The teachers and pupils of the public school presented a beautiful bouquet, while numerous other presents were received from various parts of the country. Six daughters and three sons, together with sixteen grandchildren, were present. Captain Farris enlisted in the union army July 4, 1861, and served all through the war. He was engaged in dozens of battles in the four years of his service, many of them being the conspicuous engagements of the war. Among the battles

in which he participated were Shiloh, Black River, assault on Vicksburg July 19-22, Vicksburg trenches May 23 to July 4, Missionary Ridge, battle of Savannah and other engagements of more or less historical importance. He was in Sherman's march from Atlanta to the sea. In 1864 he re-enlisted and after the close of the war received his discharge August 28, 1865. Captain Farris was born in Murray county, Tennessee, August 15, 1817. He married Nancy J. Bradford March 11, 1841. The couple moved to Otoe county, Nebraska, in 1867, and to Boone county in 1882. Here they located on a farm. The captain was sheriff of Boone county in 1882 and 1883. He has been a resident of Abion since that time.
