Lawyers and Perjury

The recent grand jury at Omaha indicted eight lawyers of that city and a long list of other offenders. In its report there are some notable suggestions. These affect the very fundamentals of justice and bar associations and courts should give heed to them.

Respectable lawyers have hesitated to proceed against members of their own association who have their own reason to know use illegitimate means in their practice lest people say they are envious or covetous and want to get the others' business for themselves.

The plain people do not have the means of knowing what is going on in the courts as lawyers do, and hence the abuses of court officers must always grow into scandalous proportions before they can be checked, unless courts or bar associations check them.

The Omaha grand jury dealt with the matter in a most unimpassioned way—they handled it as a painful duty. Following is an extract from its report:

"During our deliberations it has come to us through direct evidence, depositions and advice of those thoroughly in touch with the situation that the question of perjury and subornation of perjury has become a serious one in the different courts in this country. It has developed upon us to bring indictments in some instances for this practice, and while we hardly feel competent to suggest what should be done to discourage those guilty of such offenses, we believe some action should be taken in this respect. We have found this practice to obtain among witnesses, but we regret to have also to state that certain members of the bar have been equally guilty, and since it has been made the subject of controversy between the press and the bar association, we believe it is our duty to state, from our information and investigation, that the bar association cannot hold itself entirely guiltless for the conditions that have obtained by reason of their failure to act in the matters that have been brought to their attention.

This year it is different. The opening date is the same, and although each store holds its own opening, the co-operative plan has been followed so that all will benefit.
