Chicago was unchanged to ic higher for cash. Peoria unchanged, St. Louis steady for most grades and ic higher for selected parcels, Kansas City about ½c higher, and Omaha unchanged to ½c higher. The advance here came late in the seasion in sympathy with the upturn in the future market.

One of larger speculators in the trade, and a man who has favored the bull side, advanced the opinion that the upturn of yesterday in his opinion was overdone and wholly the result of pit conditions, more than anything new in the cash surroundings.

CHICAGO, March 24.—Reports, which tonight were disputed, that new corn from Argentine was already at the wharves in Galveston put a stop today to an advance in prices of grain. After reaching a new high level for 1914 the corn market here closed nervous at the same as last night to \( \frac{1}{2} \) c down. The outcome in wheat and oats coincides, both unchanged to \( \frac{1}{2} \) off. In provisions there was a net decline of 2\( \frac{1}{2} \) c to 10c.

Before word came that some of the new Argentine crop was actually almost at the doors of hard-pressed consumers in Texas and northward to Nebraska and Missouri many buil speculators seemed the doors of hard-pressed consumers in Texas and northward to Nebraska and Missouri many bull speculators seemed determined to lift the corn market in a way that would be long remembered. The effort, however, made a tempting opportunity for other holders to unload and to realize profits. This was done in wholesale fashion, and when the Galveston reports became current a number of belated longs found themselves sacrificed on stop loss orders, the action of which had previously appeared a remote chance. Fear was expressed by one authority that Argentine corn had been overbought for Galveston. It was said that a single concern had purchased 80,000 bushels to arrive there, and that other firms had booked similar amounts. On the other hand, primary receipts today throughout the United States were only 84,000 bushels, as against 4,422,000 bushels on the corresponding day a year ago.

Dry weather advices from Kansas and also from Minnesota and North Dakota helped wheat upward, while corn was on the advance, but after the big spill in the coarser grain wheat quickly receded. There was no export demand and the mills were not buyers.

The manifest curtailment of buying encouraged the shorts and the market lost its opening advantage. But little was accumplished other than to check the upturn. The undertone was too strong to permit of extensive bear seiling. During the latter part of the day the market was dull and lifeless.

Weakness again developed among some of the specialties. Rumely issues resumed their decline, making new low records at 9 for the common and 25% for the preferred. Active liquidation of corn products shares was caused by the remark of President Bedford at the annual meeting of the company that if the corporation were dissolved as a result of the government's suit the com-
