Selling Illegalty.

Indications of activity of the Auti-Saloon league were apparent yesterday, when F. A. High, district superintendent of Omaha of the league, with an assistant started to copy the records of government licenses issued from the office of Ross L. Hammond, collector of internal

revenue for the state of Nebraska. It has been said that there were more bootleggers in Omaha than there were legitimate saloons and indications are that the activities of the Anti-Saloon league will be directed toward the bootleggers and others who sell liquor in violation of the law, including those druggists who neglect to keep a register of their liquor sales.

The records in the office of the col lector of internal revenue here show all government liquor licenses issued in the state of Nebraska, and it is probable that the campaign against these violators of the law will be waged not only in Omaha, but throughout the entire state.

"We are emphatically against liquor selling by anybody," said Superintendent High, "but we are more interested in the prosecution of a bootlegger or druggist who is selling liquor illegally than anybody else. We believe that if anyone must sell liquor the men who have Milk Dealers Are paid the license for the privilege of selling liquor should be permitted to do so instead of bootleggers. We will go further to prosecute a bootlegger or illegal selling drug store than anyone else.


