Pay Patterson for Lots—A jury in Judge Troup's district court awarded to D. C. Patterson a verdict for \$1,000 for three lots in a sunken locality at Thirty-fifth and Leavenworth, which were appropriated by the city in 1909. Mr. Patterson sued for \$3,000.

Name New Towns—Three new towns have been located and named on the Burlington's Thermopolis-Casper extension. They are between Powder River and Casper and are Petrie, Bucknum and Cadona. Though young, they are said to give promise of having considerable growth during the coming summer. As yet, none of them have been supplied with agents, though station houses have been built.

Coupland Again Asks Honor of Being University Regent

George Coupland announces himself as a candidate for the board of regents of the University of Nebraska. Mr. Coupland has been an active since his incumbency of the office he holds, and has devoted much of his time to inquiries and investigations that have resulted in improvements in the service and betterments in the conditions at the university. On the subject of campus removal, he says:

"The people of the state are showing an increasing desire to make the proper provision for the housing of the several colleges of the university and also to more adequately compensate its teaching force. And through the last legislature have taxed themselves to provide a building fund, which it is hoped will yield about \$2,500,000. I am confident that with a judicious and careful use of this money, magnificent provision can be made for the housing of all the colleges of the university.

"The question of whether the several colleges shall all be located upon the state farm and the agricultural colleges permitted to become a physical integral part of the university will be submitted to a referendum vote of the people next November in accordance with the provisions of the law which created the fund to furnish the money for the building fund.

"After a most exhaustive study of the question of consolidation, I am led to the firm conviction that for the state's best interests, both economically and educationally and especially for the interest of the student body, it would be a wise thing to put the university's several activities all together upon one campus. However, should the people of the state decide to separate the agricultural college from the main university and develop it by itself upon the state farm and extend the downtown campus and other colleges there, I shall, if again elected to serve as regent, do all in my power to assist in a wise and judicious use of the money now voted, and give to the university, whether united or divided, my most loyal support and service."

Shipment of Citrus Fruit Very Heavy

Shipment of citrus fruit out of California has now reached its heaviest stage and an average of eighty cars per day are being handled by the Union Pacific. The shipments are expected to continue at about this rate during the next six weeks.

Into Omaha the Union Pacific is now handling two trains of oranges, lemons and grape fruit a day. Here the fruit is diverted and sent in every direction, with large quantities going into cold storage, where it will be held by the commission men until later in the season.

Up to now this year's crop of California citrus fruit has moved to a large extent over the southern route. Now, however, through Arizona to New Mexico the weather has become so hot that the icing of cars is necessary, and as a result about everything is taking a northern route.

SON SELLS OLD BEDTICK FOR PRICE OF ONE DRINK

Culls from the Wire.

Two hundred and fifty hotel proprietors of San Francisco agreed in an executive session of their association yesterday not to raise their charges above the rates now

prevailing during the year of the Panama-Pacific international exposition. Increases in freight rates on cement ranging from 1 to 2 cents a hundred pounds, proposed by railroads operating throughout the middle west and northwest, were suspended yesterday by the Interstate Commerce commission at

Washington until July 31. The proposed advances average about 15 per cent. The Michigan motor car tax law, passed at the last session of the legislature providing for a tax of 20 cents per horsepower on motor vehicles, was yesterday declared unconstitutional by the Michigan supreme court at Lansing. It

was said at the secretary of state's office that approximately \$25,000 has been collected under the new law and this money will now be returned to automobile owners with the exception of \$5, which was the tax under the provisions of the old law.
