REBELS TRAPPED AND MINES ARE EXPLODED, REPORT OF FEDERALS

(Continued from Page One.)

cut and dangerous situation. The many days of almost constant aggressive warfare at Gomez Palacio and within the city of Torreón, it is thought, have exhausted both men and supplies. From stories told by the wounded, the rebels managed to run into a trap at Gomez Palacio which cost them nearly 100 men and ammunition. But spurred by the seemingly irresistible energy of General Villa, the soldiers pushed on, winning victory from what promised defeat and carried their fight to the very heart of Torreón.

Rebel Loss Heavy.
JUAREZ, Mex., March 30.—An official message from the front tonight states that fighting is still going on for the possession of Torreón.

The telegram says the rebels now hold all positions except the main barracks and two smaller barracks. In the last twenty-four hours it is reported that General Villa took Cerro de la Cruz and the Torreón foundry.

Another telegram admits a rebel loss in the last six days of 900 killed and wounded, and places the federal loss at 2,000. As there are already at Chihuahua 600 wounded, the report of rebel losses is thought to have been minimized. Among the rebel wounded is General Tomas Urbina.

It is said that private soldiers taken prisoners are being received into the rebel ranks, but their officers are executed, unless they take the oath of allegiance to the constitutional cause. All irregular troops in the federal garrison are executed upon capture.

Fighting Since Friday.
The attack on Torreón began last Friday, and up to last night rebel advances, private and official, were that General Monclovia Herrera had taken some of the most important points in the city.

There have been no news dispatches dealing with this attack, and the similarity of this situation with that at Gomez Palacio is pointed out as significant. When Villa was successful there he permitted the newspaper men to send their dispatches, but when he was repulsed, as he was twice, press messages suddenly ceased.

In Juarez it was confidently expressed that news of the capture of the city would form the chief feature of the welcome to General Carranza, and the fact that no message of success of any kind was awaiting him was accepted as indicating that the fate of the city was still in the balance today.

YORK, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Dr. S. V. Moore died at the family home, 20 West Fifth street, Sunday morning. He was 81 years old last September. He is survived by a wife and two children, Dr. O. M. Moore and Mrs. Carl Brynes, of this city. He came to York county in 1868 and took a homestead just north of the present town of Bradshaw, where he built a sod house and ministered to the sick in that part of the county, there being only two physicians in the county.

GO-TO-CHURCH MOVE SUCCESS

Pews Are Filled in Spite of the Lowering Skies.

ATTENDANCE INCREASED 25,637

Promoters of the Go-to-Church Campaign Say that Its Success Was Far Above Their Anticipation.

According to figures furnished The Bee by the pastors of the several churches in Greater Omaha, 52,731 persons attended divine services at one or another of the churches yesterday. This is an increase over the normal attendance of 16,837.

Where the increase comes. This increase in attendance, due to the "Go to Church" movement, is reported entirely by the Protestant churches, the Catholic churches returning normal attendance figures, with no showing of additional devotion due to the day a special purpose. The Protestant churches give their normal Sunday morning attendance at 14,730, and the morning attendance for yesterday at 22,800, a gain for the day of 8,070. For the evening services the normal figures are 10,114, and the special service figures are 16,921, a gain for Sunday evening of 6,707.

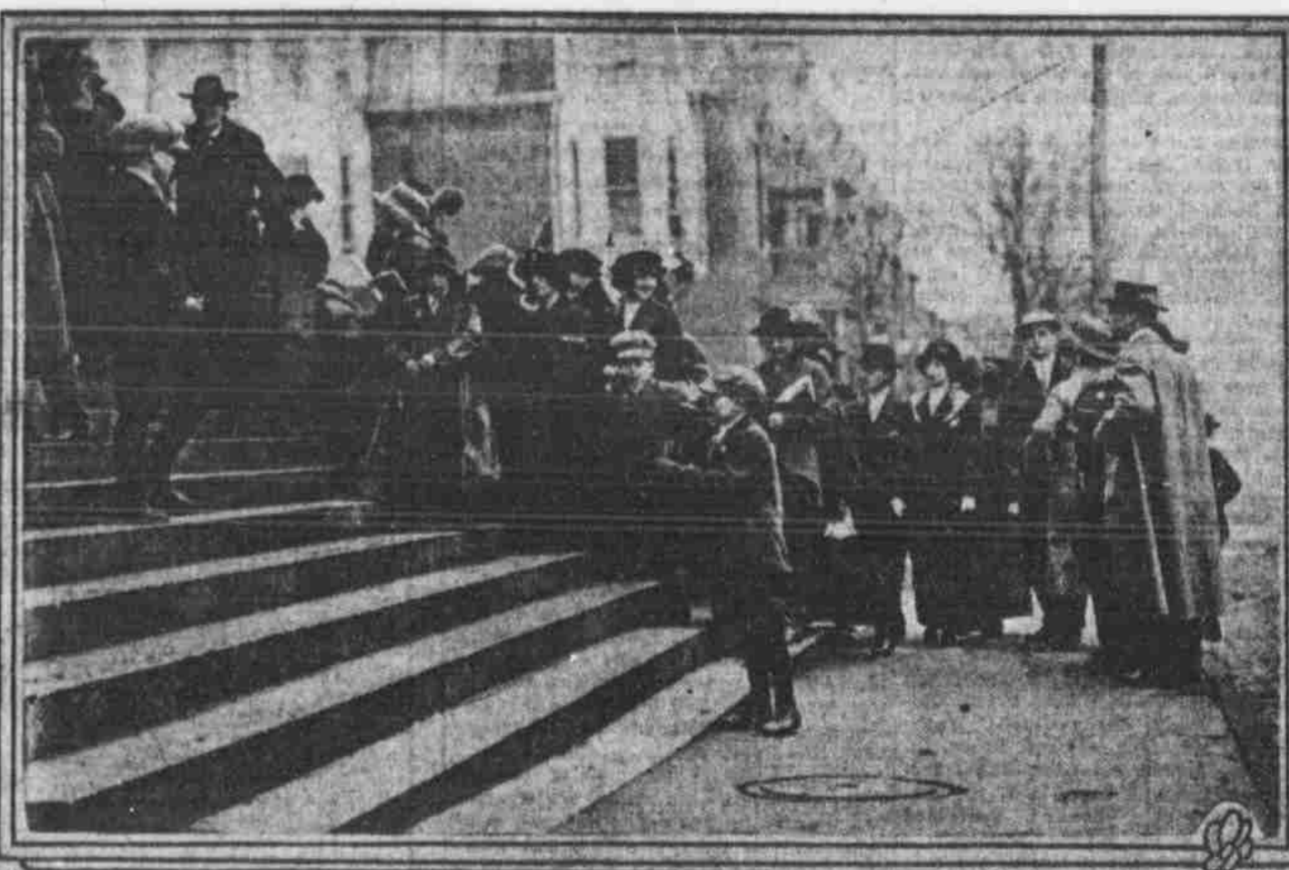

REPUBLICANS AGREE TO WORK IN HARMONY

need to counsel and co-operate with the gentlemen of the other committee. "By such plan a call of the state convention will issue to the same county organizations to which they would be sent if we were acting alone. Both committees would recognize all republicans. All the republicans throughout the state would send their delegates to a single state convention. The party would then be in the hands of its members. It belongs to them and not any committee."

Smith for Harmony

The Epperson committee, after selecting E. L. Havens of Beatrice temporary secretary, listened to the address of Chairman Epperson, and then a motion by Robert Smith of Omaha to accept the third plan offered by the chairman, and which had been agreed to by both Chairman Currie and Chairman Epperson, for both committees to call the convention was seconded by C. D. Brown of Papillion.

A. L. Schoonover of Aurora offered a substitute motion that the committee proceed to call the convention. This motion made no reference to the Currie committee. John O. Yeiser of Omaha got in a substitute to the substitute that the committee call the convention and invite the Currie committee to come in.

This brought on a discussion of the motion and the substitute. A. M. Bushnell taking the floor and talking against any proposition which would recognize the Currie committee. I. D. Evans of Kansas, although he had written an article in a local paper endorsing the get-together movement, seemed to have seen another light and endorsed the stand taken by Bushnell. C. J. Garlow of Columbus, who said he came from the Texas of Nebraska, wanted it understood that the Taft men out little figures in Platte county, and he wanted the committee to go ahead and call the convention without any regard for the other committee.

Cordeal for Joint Call

Senator Cordeal of McCook believed the plan of the chairman of the two committees for a joint convention call to be the wisest one. "We may have had differences in the past," said the senator, "but now we want to forget those and look to the future."

E. R. Bee of Beatrice said that the progressive republicans would not be giving up any principle by recognizing the Taft republicans now, nor would they be violating any pledge as set out by Mr. Bushnell. County Treasurer W. G. Epperson favored the committee plan and believed it was the wisest thing for both committees to get together upon an equal basis. Clerk of the District Court Robert B. Smith of Omaha said that unless a harmony plan was adopted it would create a chaotic condition in Omaha. He thought that if the meeting today did not agree upon a plan for united action that two committees would result and the party would be wider apart than ever before. He thought it foolish to quibble over who had authority. He thought both committees should be given equal authority and call the convention together.

Finally Change Attitude

In about thirty minutes the committee came back and announced that the following resolution had been agreed upon by the two sub-committees: "Resolved, That Chairman Epperson proceed to call the state convention and that the Currie committee be invited to join and co-operate in the call."

This was adopted by the Epperson committee unanimously. A motion to base the call on the convention would be composed of about 1,000 delegates was passed. Then three cheers were given for the republican party and everybody shook hands and appeared happy, except a few democrats who for half an hour had been jabbering over what looked like a continuation of the split. The meeting of the Currie committee was without any contention of any kind. The motion to adopt the recommendations of Chairman Currie and Epperson were unanimously adopted and good feeling was shown by all.

What speeches were made all urged getting together in some way to bring about a unity which would result in victory all along the line in November. The attendance at the Currie committee meeting was considerably larger than at the Epperson meeting.

Rising, Ainsworth. Secretary Bureau of the committee could not be present on account of the serious illness of Mrs. Reneau. A good attendance of republicans, representing both factions, was present from out in the state.
