Local Companies Must Pay on Net Receipts.

CONGRESSMAN SLOAN WRITES Statement Made in Answer to Request of Charles Schanl, Who Is

Connected with Farmers' Or-

gantzation at Seward.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, April L-(Special) congressman Sloan is receiving inquiries from Representatives of farmers insurance companies throughout this district which have been called upon to pay an income tax provided for under the Underwood tariff and income tax of October 3, 1913. A large amount of the farm insurance of the Fourth district is carried by these farmer organizations. Under

the former law if the annual income were less than \$5,000 there was no tax, but under the present law there is a tax of per cent upon the entire net income whether that amount be much or little. The following is the statement of an answer given by the congressman to his inquiry submitted in behalf of Charles Schaul of Seward, Neb. Extract from Law.

Your letter of recent date received. and I made formal inquiry at the Treasury department relative to the tax sought to be levied on your insurance company's income. I quote from the department's answer as follows: 'Under the provisions of the act

above cited 'the normal tax imposed by this act shall be levied, assessed and pald annually upon the entire net inome arising or account from all sources be called to account. during the preceding calendar year to every corporatio, joint stock company or association and every insurance company the process of organization will take organized in the United States, no matter low created or organized."

'Under this provision every corpora tion, joint stock company or association, and every insurance company not spe ifically enumerated in the act as exempt is required to make a return of annual net income and to pay any income tax thereby shown to be due. No provision is made in the act for the exemption of any insurance company except fraternal bemeficiary associations or orders operated under the lodge system. Hope for Far West.

It said in this connection: The committee was impressed with the dea that growth of and development of the states of Idaho, Washington and Oregon, but on the hasis of the 6 per cent of the capital stock and surplus of national banks and state banks and trust companies which have applied for membership, that rection could not provide the \$6.000,000 minimum capital atock required by the law. With the continued growth of that region it is reasonable to expect that in a few years the capital and surplus of its member banks will be sufficlent to justify the creation of an addidonal reserve district, at which time apsilcation may be made to the congress for a grant of the necessary authority. The next step to be taken by the organization committee will be the notification to banks entering the system of the plans for the districts. Within thirty days after such notice is received by banks, each must under the law begin the payment for its stock in the reserve bank in its district. Each bank must subscribe 6 per cent of its combined capital and surplus and the capitalization annced for each district is based upon this 4 per cent subscription.

Would Violate Contract. In his decision, Justice Greenbaum said "If the defendant corporation has the

right to accumulate a surplus, it has the right to invest that surplus in securities and if those securities appreciate in value, there is no reason why the profits should not be regarded as profits of the business of the corporation.

"The agreement, however, reads that the preferred stock is entitled to no other or further share of profits than dividends in each and every fiscal year not exceeding 4 per cer\$ a ye #; payable out of net profits. The preferred stockholders have regularly received a 4 per cent annual dividend.

"To hold now, because an unusually large or extraordinary dividend is declared from accumulated surplus or profits, that the preferred stockholders are entitled to participate therein, would be to nullify and override the existing contract between the two classes of shareholders.
