### TIMBER LAND KING IS DEAD

Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser Dies After Ten Days' Illness.

### INTERMENT AT ROCK ISLAND

Body is on Way to Former Home for Burial—Four Sons and Three Daughters with Him at the End.

PARADENA, Cal., April 4.—Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser, the multi-millionaire Minnesota lumberman, died today at his winter home at Oak Knoll, aged 73. Mr. Weyerhaeuser was stricken ten days ago with a severe cold. Threatening symptoms developed, and several times he sank to the verge of death, but rallied, and yesterday appeared to be all but recovered.

Mr. Weyerhaeuser's body was sent east at noon aboard a limited train, bound for Rock Island, Ill., his old home, for interment.

Mr. Weyerhaeuser caught cold Sunday a week ago while attending church. On the following Wednesday his condition became so alarming that his children were sent for. Three physicians were called and remained in constant attendance day and night. They managed to overcome recurrent sinking spells until shortly after 5 o'clock this morning, when the patient sank into a coma and passed away at 8:30 o'clock.

His sons, John, Frederick, Rudolph and Charles, and his daughters, Mrs. Margaret Jewett, Mrs. W. B. Hill and Mrs. S. S. Davis, were at the bedside at the end.

The final sinking spell came at a time when it was believed Mr. Weyerhaeuser would recover. Several days ago he appeared to be on the verge of death, but reports to oxygen failed him, and thereafter he appeared to improve rapidly. The only disquieting symptom was an uncertain heart action, and the physician believed yesterday they had finally overcome this. But this morning it recurred, and neither oxygen nor any other stimulant would avail.

Climb to Wealth is Quiet.  
ST. PAUL, Minn., April 4.—Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser's climb to wealth was only discovered by the people of the nation when it had become a question as to whether he was richer than John D. Rockefeller. The exact amount of his riches is not known. He started in the lumber business at Rock Island, Ill., in the early '60s.

Mr. Weyerhaeuser dominated the lumber industry of the United States during the years prior to the doctrine of conservation of national resources.

He was born in a small village on the Rhine near the city of Mainz, Germany, November 21, 1841. After his father died the rest of the family came to Northeast, Erie county, Pa., when Frederick was 13 years old.

In early life Mr. Weyerhaeuser decided he would become a brewer and went to work at \$4 a month. He gave up the brewing idea finally because, as he expressed it, "I realize how many brewers become their own best customers."

Mr. Weyerhaeuser was employed at a salary of \$13 a month. After four years at Northeast the family moved to Coal Valley, Rock Island county, Ill., in 1864.

The boy worked on the night shift as a fireman in the saw mill of Mead, Smith & Marsh. In 1867 he married Elizabeth Blodet, who had come from his home town, and settled in Erie, Pa. Mrs. Weyerhaeuser died two years ago. Seven children have all grown to maturity. John P. Weyerhaeuser is the oldest.

Elsie is the wife of Dr. William B. Hill of the faculty of Vassar college at Poughkeepsie.

Margaret is Mrs. J. R. Jewett. Her husband is a professor of Semitic languages at the University of Chicago.

Apollonia married S. S. Davis, who is head of the Weyerhaeuser Rock Island interests, exclusive of lumber.

The three younger sons are Charles A., Rudolph M. and Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser. All four sons have been engaged in business with their father.

Half Million Acres in Oregon.  
SALEM, Ore., April 4.—According to an estimate made by State Forester Elliott the timber holdings of the late Frederick Weyerhaeuser in Oregon total about 50,000 acres. These lands are scattered through the state, but the largest holdings are in Klamath, Lake, Coos and Clackamas counties. The state forester was unable to estimate their exact value, but most of the lands are of a choice character and are worth many millions of dollars.

practiced on the wounded and prisoners, were on the verge of mutiny.

In the course of the house to house fighting, rebels and federalists frequently came within talking distance of each other and in some cases got on such friendly terms that they ceased firing entirely. In most of these cases the federalists were persuaded to remain when Velasco retreated and will be enrolled under the rebel banner.

At least a fortnight and probably a longer period will be required to reorganize the army before the expected campaign against Saltillo and Monterrey can be made.

Rebel leaders are anxiously awaiting news of the political effect of their victory on Mexico City and Washington.

The federal artillery was superior to that of the rebels, many of whose shells proved defective.

### Villa is Soul of Battle.

Villa was the very soul of the battle. His spirit animated everything. When things were going wrong, he would gallop along the battle line encouraging or reprimanding as the individual case required.

"Well done," he said, to the gunner whose shells had fallen true. "Men like you will redeem Mexico," he complimented a wounded man, who remained in the firing line.

"What, boy, do you find the dancing floor too rough?" he chided a soldier, who on some pretext was making for the rear.

Villa was in his headquarters at Gomez Palacio Thursday night, when Torreón fell. Almost up to the hour of the federal flight he could not see the end of the battle, and that very morning had telegraphed for bigger cannon, for it seemed as if his artillery were inadequate to dislodge the enemy from their positions in Ebarache.

His black, thick hair was matted and standing straight up for the most part, and a six-day stubble of beard was on his face. News of the evacuation had reached him and he smiled, fairly purring his answers to questions put by newspaper men.

"Tell the public that after eleven days' fighting the federalists evacuated Torreón, leaving their dead and wounded behind them. That is all," he concluded.

Nine Americans with Villa.  
Stories are told here of insults to the American flag perpetrated by federal soldiers who were enraged by rumors that a large number of Americans were in Villa's army. As a matter of fact, there were but nine of these. None of them was killed or wounded.

Dr. A. N. Carr, an American resident of Torreón, was the only physician at duty when the rebels took the town. He transferred his services to Villa and the latter instructed him to continue his work in the hospital. The formal entry into the city was without ceremony.

The victory has greatly raised the spirits of the soldiers who have come through a very trying campaign and who now talk confidently of the taking of the national capital itself.

### Suffragists Create a Diversion During Unionist Meeting

LONDON, April 4.—Suffragettes created a diversion during the Unionist demonstration in Hyde Park today, and as a result "General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, and the Misses Rogers and Virtue, were arrested.

The women, 1,000 strong marched through the London streets to the park. Although the police had not given a permit for the procession, the women forced their way through crowds gathered at the gates of the park. The paraders were waving the suffragette colors.

Immediately on their entrance to the park, crowds of rowdies charged them. For an hour a fierce fight was in progress, the police repeatedly interfering to save the women from the mob.

Miss Virtue was on the point of being thrown into the river when policemen got her out of the hands of her tormentors.

In the meantime Mrs. Drummond and other speakers, perched on the shoulders of men sympathizers, harangued the crowd making a particular point of interfering with the Unionist speakers, William Burdett Goutts and William J. Hicks, both members of parliament.

A delegation of twelve Americans, who refused to give their names, marched to the women's procession carrying the Stars and Stripes. One of them was identified as Miss Weatherly of Portland, Ore., while the leader described herself as a daughter to a former ambassador to Turkey.

### BODY CREMATED IN FURNACE

Oriental Confesses He Struck the Woman with Chair Because She Scolded Him—Then Choked Her to Death.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 4.—Jack Kong, the 17-year-old Chinese boy suspected of the murder of Mrs. Charles J. Millard, wife of a Canadian Pacific railway official, confessed today that he committed the crime.

The boy told the police that at breakfast Wednesday Mrs. Millard found fault with him. He struck her with a chair and stunned her and then choked her to death, he said. Later he took her body to the basement, where he cut it up and placed it in the furnace, piece by piece. He hid the clothing in order to convince Mr. Millard that his wife had gone out in the morning. The skull and other bones have been found in the chimney beyond the furnace, the police said.

Her husband came home at 11 o'clock Wednesday night, and believing his wife to be at her sister's home, went to bed. Millard talked to the boy at the police station today. The Chinese said that Mrs. Millard, attired in her house dress, left the house at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning and he did not see her again.
