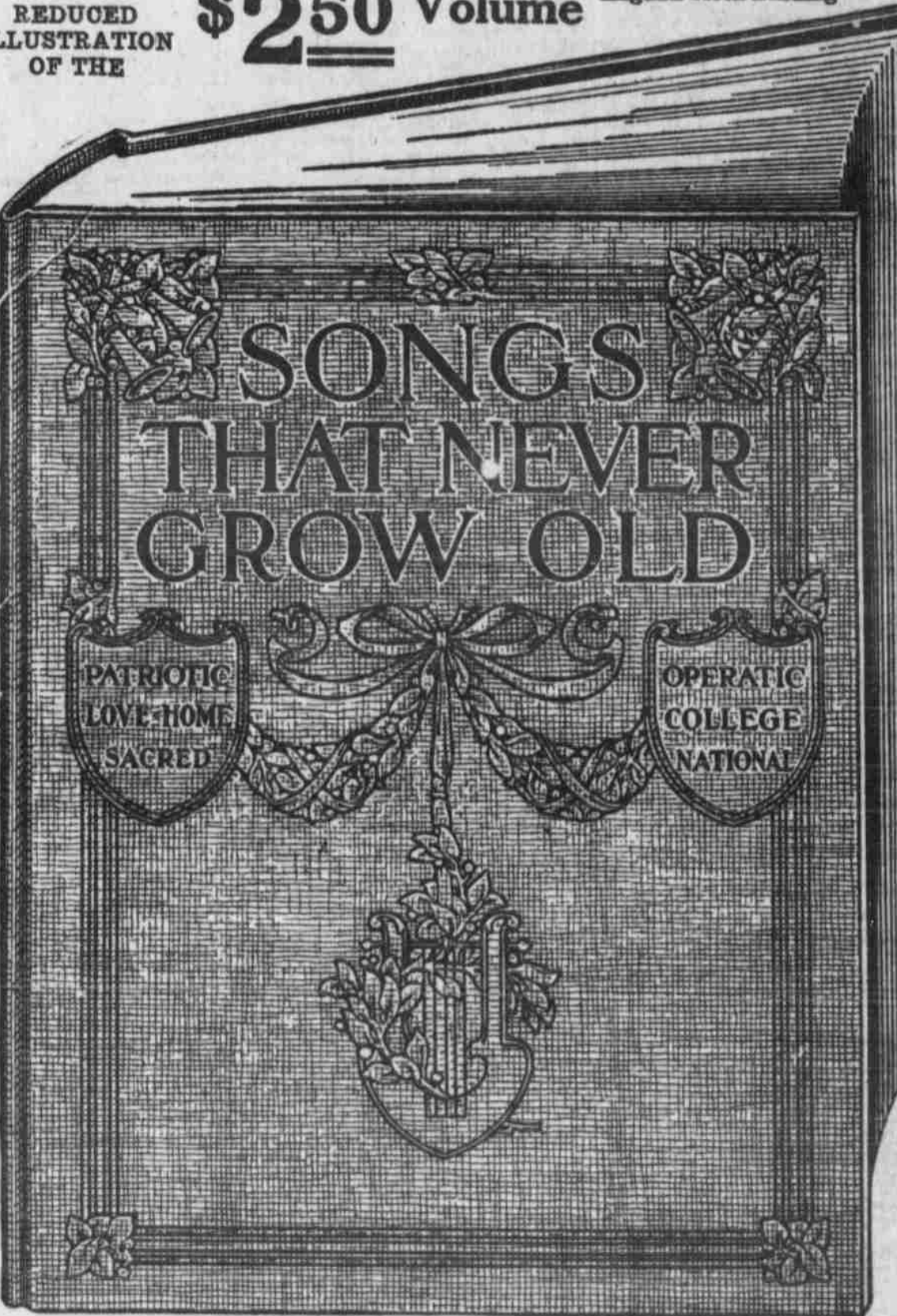

Dean McMenemy of Creighton selects the Final Contestants. WILL HOLD MEET ON APRIL 26 Students to Be Divided into Three Divisions and Length of Declaration Will Be Restricted to Six Minutes. Results of the semi-finals in the elocution contests held at Creighton during the last week, were announced Saturday by Dean F. X. McMenemy. Those selected from the speakers in the contests will appear in the finals as representatives in the annual academic and college contests. The annual meeting for students of the academic department of the arts college will be held in three divisions at the university auditorium, April 26. The winner in each division will be given a medal at the end of the school year. The length of the declamations will be restricted to six minutes. The contest in the college section will be held at the same place Wednesday, May 6, pieces being limited to nine minutes. The song was not only written by an Omaha, but the cover design, the engraving and the printing were also done by Omahans, and the song has been taken up quite generally for use by Omaha boosters.

Commercial Club Favors the Offer By Bee Building

The Commercial club took with favor on the offer made by the Bee Building company to heat the city hall for \$5.60 a year. The municipal affairs committee of the club decided in favor of the city buying its heat instead of paying \$15.00 for new boilers for its own plant, and the executive committee has voted favorably on the report and has sent a communication to the city officials. Following is the resolution as adopted by the municipal affairs committee and approved by the executive committee of the Commercial club: Whereas, It appears that the boilers at the city hall have outlived their usefulness and it is now proposed to install new boilers and make changes therewith that will entail an expense of approximately \$15,000; and, Whereas, The actual annual cost for coal, supplies and labor to provide heat, power, etc., for said city hall has been in the past approximately \$5,500 per annum, which does not include depreciation on boilers or interest on cost, and there is no reason to suppose it would be less in the future; and, Whereas, The Bee Building company has offered to provide heat and power for the said city hall at a cost of \$5.60 per annum, and estimates have been received showing that steam could be furnished from the county court house at considerably less than would be the annual cost of maintaining and operating a plant in the city hall; be it therefore Resolved, That the Commercial club, believing it will result in a material saving to the taxpayers, recommends that the city do not enter into a contract for the purchase of new boilers, but enter into arrangements for obtaining steam heat and power and for the furnishing of hot water either with the county or with such companies as will furnish these facilities on such terms as will be to the best advantage of the city of Omaha.
