### TWO STATES' CEREMONIES

Site for Iowa Building at San Francisco Dedicated.

### NEBRASKA CORNERSTONE LAID

General Pershing and President Moore, with Commissioners of Two States, Review Troops at the Presidio.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 7.-(Special Telegram.)-Iowa was added to the list of commonwealths participating in the Panama-Pacific international exposition, and Nebraska laid the cornerstone of the Nebraska state building, the site of which was dedicated nearly two years ago, with impressive ceremonies at the exposition grounds yesterday.

The site for the future Iowa pavilion was dedicated by Governor George Clarke. Immediately following the dedication of the Iowa site, Lieutenant Governor McKelvie of Nebraska and Miss Katherine Hughes of Lincoln, Neb., laid the cornerstones for the Nebraska building on the site dedicated by the Nebraska commission.

### WOMEN VOTERS OF ILLINOIS EXPECT TO CLOSE MANY SALOONS

Walter Lester dashed into police headquarters at Pana at 4 o'clock this morning and reported that he had been held up by twenty-five armed men and robbed of 3,000 election ballots. As a result Pana township may not be able to vote on the liquor question today.

Printers had been working all night to get out the liquor question ballots. As soon as they were printed they were entrusted to Lester and he started to his office with them. He said he was unable to identify any of the men.

The attack came after a vigorous attempt made to keep the "wet" and "dry" question off the ballot. A mandamus was issued last week to compel Lester to have the ballots printed on the question. An effort is being made to have more printed so that the election can take place today.

Commission Form is Issue. KANSAS CITY, April 7.-Commission government was an issue in today's municipal election, which opened with brisk voting.

Not in a score of years has a city election attracted such interest. This probably is due to the introduction of a non-partisan ticket pledged to commission government.

Mayor Henry L. Yost, democrat, sought re-election against the nonpartisan candidate, Clarence A. Burton, the progressive candidate, Joseph P. Ponton, and the republican candidate, Harry E. Barker.

During the campaign women got their first experience in politics. Although the women could not vote they canvassed the wards and checked up the voters. Municipal elections were held today in St. Joseph, Joplin and Sedalia, Mo., as well as in many of the smaller cities of Kansas.

Socialists Active in Milwaukee. MILWAUKEE, April 7.-Socialists were out in force today and cast their ballots early in an effort to elect Emil Seidel mayor over Gerhard A. Bading, non-partisan candidate for re-election. Seidel was formerly mayor for one term, but was defeated for re-election by a coalition of republicans and democrats.

Heavy Vote in Springfield. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 7.-Though rain fell in torrents the polling places were crowded with women when the booths were opened today and the battle to determine whether the state capital shall be wet or dry was begun. Before 10 o'clock half of the normal vote of the city had been cast. Long lines of voters stood in the rain waiting their turn at the polls, but there was no disturbance, although extra officers had been assigned to guard the ballot boxes. Five women are running for office in Springfield.

Liquor is Issue in Minnesota. ST. PAUL, Minn., April 7.-The liquor license question was an issue in a score of Minnesota cities today. Under the local option law of 1913 many cities voted for the first time on the license question.

### Henry Proposes to Unmask Coastwise Shipping Combine

WASHINGTON, April 7.-"Its purpose is to unmask the shipping trust," said Representative Henry, democrat, of Texas, in explanation of a resolution he introduced to authorize an investigation of steamship transportation of freight between the Atlantic and Pacific ports in the coastwise trade.

Joint ownership, common control, holding companies, interlocking stock and directors and other officers and rates would be investigated. Mr. Henry said the information would be used in connection with the senate's consideration of the Panama tolls repeal.

The mayor is elected by the board. The vote was: Against saloon, 100; for saloon, 59; against Sunday base ball, 38; for Sunday base ball, 70.

LYONS - For village trustee: Paul Karo, 304; M. Schumway, 137; J. J. Halden, 120. Henry Preston, 114; Walter White, 7. The first three were on the citizens' ticket, the latter two by petition. The big fight was against the pool halls and the present city marshal, made by the losing party.

ORLEANS - Remained wet by a margin of 12. BLOOMINGTON - Voted wet, 32 to 38. S. Y. Harte was elected as mayor. PILGER - This town remains wet, this being the only issue of the election. The citizens' ticket was elected.

HEIMAN - Remained wet, the vote being 72 to 22. William Shafterman was re-elected mayor. WILBER - V. J. Kopout and Joseph Bartos were elected to the village board without any opposition. There was no issue and no change from last year.

SPRINGFIELD - Election resulted in a majority of eight for license, a loss of ten from last year. There were 130 votes cast. Dr. A. J. Peters, R. V. Cornish and W. W. Deas were chosen members of the town board.

PAPILLON - Fred Hawhow and Elmer Lundgren, republicans, and William Patterson, democrat, were elected members of the town board.

PONCA - E. L. Woods, republican, was elected mayor over Walter Heydon, democrat, by twenty-four majority. The town voted no license. The town of Craig today voted to license pool halls, 57 to 28, and elected three trustees.

GREENWOOD - The voters won by a margin of thirty-two. John Connelly, Dan Kelly, John E. Schilling and A. D. Wilson, were elected trustees.

Wet at Eustis. EUSTIS - At the most exciting village election ever held here, at which 108 votes were cast, G. K. Houlsen, J. S. Thrasher and John Fray, were elected. There were two tickets in the field. The village is wet although license was not the issue. The initiative and referendum question and Sunday base ball proposition were killed, they being the issues of the campaign, the former lost by nineteen and the later by three.

Callaway Dry. CALLAWAY - After the town has been wet for two successive years, the drys carried the election today by a majority of three. The question of Sunday base ball carried by a majority of ten. The temperance candidates lost by an average of seventy votes.

OAKLAND - At the election today Oakland went dry by a large majority. For license, 101; against, 187. The electric light franchise carried by almost a three to one majority.
