

Two New Boats Are Ready for the Start

J. B. Reynolds, city passenegr agent for the Burlington and also the agent for the steamships Vaterland of the Hamburg-American, and the Aquitania of the Cunard line, is booking a number of Omaha people for the initial trips of the two boats, the former sailing from New York May 25 and the latter June 10. Both are new boats, the first named being a German and the other a British ship.

The Vaterland is the largest craft affoat, having a carrying capacity of 58,-600 tons. Its length is 950 feet over all, this being more than the length of three city blocks. It is 100 feet in width and is capable of handling and acommodating some 4,000 passengers and a crew of 1,000. The Aquitania, while not so large as the Vaterland, is a giant of the ocean, being 901 feet long, ninety-seven feet in width and almost ninety-three feet deep. It can acommodate 3,250 passengers.




