WILL REVIVE LAND CASES

Government to Get After Some of the Big Ranch Owners.

CHARGE IS FRAUDULENT ENTRY

Dummy Entrymen Are Used to Acquire Title to Some Large Tracts in the Western Part of the State.

Between 25,000 and 100,000 acres of government land in Nebraska may revert to the government through prosecutions which have been and are being instituted on evidence furnished by special agents of the field service of the general land office.

H. B. Durham, special agent, is in Omaha completing reports on recent investigations which he has made. He has had charge of the work on some of the larger Nebraska cases, several of which involve more than 2,500 acres of land.

The common charges in the prosecution of these cases has been fraudulent entry and the use of dummy entrymen by cattlemen in the western section of the state.

City Hall Heating Question is Turned Over to the Mayor

The recommendation of the Commercial club that the city commission arrange to have the city hall heated from the heating plant of an adjacent building instead of going to the expense of repairing the old boilers was referred to the mayor by the council.

Mayor Dahlman asked that the communication be turned over to his office, as he has the other documents in the matter.

An appropriation of \$15,000 was authorized by the council for the repair of the boiler plants at the city hall.
