DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Sentiment Strengthened by Government Wheat Report.

Improvements in Certain Directions Offset by Reactionary Tendency.

Advices from Centers Vary.

NEW YORK, April 10.—Dun's Review tomorrow will say:

Sentiment, especially in the agricultural regions, is strengthened by the splendid government report on water wheel and the outlook for an almost phenomenal crop is calculated to inspire greater confidence in the future.

Reflecting the brilliant prospects, the leading cereal is receding in value, yet the purchasing power of the farming community should be enhanced if the present promise of a bumper yield is fulfilled.

The volume of railroad traffic will obviously expand with an increased production of grain and monetary conditions largely in accord with the general market.

Failures this week in the United States are 231, against 277 last year. Failures in Canada number fifty-five, against twenty-eight last year.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW

Crop Prospects Contrast with Trade Distribution.

NEW YORK, April 10.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

Excellent early crop prospects, which buoy sentiment, sharply contrast with disappointing trade distribution, freight rates, and cautious buying for the future.

While crop prospects, as well as indications of heavy planting, are such as to superinduce optimism, buying continues on the basis of immediate wants. At most centers mail order houses are reported doing a thriving business.

Reports from industrial centers present mixed aspects, resumption in this or that place being offset by slower operations at other points. The steel trade takes hope from crop prospects, but the volume of business is not up to expectations.

For the week failures were 252, against 212 last year; wheat exports, 2,473,230 bu., against 2,633,445 bu.; bank clearings, \$3,356,657,000, an increase of 15 per cent.

PROCEEDS AGAINST HOTELS

Iowa Anti-Saloon League Files Several Injunction Suits.

Successful Candidate for Council to Run for Congress on Republican Ticket is the Latest Report.

DEB MOINES, April 10.—Special Telegram.—Two hotels, one cafe and nine drug stores were made defendants in liquor injunction actions brought here today by W. C. Barber of the Iowa Anti-Saloon League.

Barber charges that the Kirkwood hotel, Iowa hotel and Chicago grill are guilty of violating the law regarding the sale of intoxicating liquor.

Councilman J. J. Myley, just elected to the Des Moines city council by the highest plurality ever honoring a local candidate, may become a candidate for congress of the republican ticket from this district, according to a report today. His friends here believe his candidacy is certain.

Conference Takes Rescess.

The joint conference of the United Mine Workers and the Iowa coal operators will probably adjourn tomorrow for a ten days recess following the committee completion of the preliminary work on the new contract. The conference deferred action on the resolution covering the hiring and firing of men, the most important problem of the conference so far. A number of less prominent resolutions also will be taken up when the conference reconvenes.

President W. H. Rodgers of District No. 13, announces today the creation of a legal department for the miners with State Senator John T. Clarkson of Albia in charge. This department will act for the union men in all personal injury cases and any other litigation in which they may be involved.

Meredith for Senator.

F. T. Meredith, editor of a farmers' magazine published in Des Moines, today announced his candidacy for the nomination for United States senator on the democratic ticket. Meredith will be a leader in the democratic fight in Iowa during the coming campaign. This is unquestioned. Meredith says that his prominence locally and the acquaintance he has drawn around him throughout the state. He will be opposed by Maurice Connolly of Dubuque.

Meredith was at one time mentioned as a candidate for governor, but refused to campaign for that place.

Aligned at Butter Prices.

Some twenty-five butter produce men closed a conference in Des Moines this morning, which had been called on account of trade prices. H. R. Wright, H. W. Dunlap and others of Des Moines, representing the Beatrice Creamery company and the Des Moines Produce company, headed the movement. Plans for putting the butter business in Iowa on a better basis were discussed, but no definite plan was adopted. Butter-makers say that the foreign invasion coupled with low prices is proving disastrous to the local market.

Shipments from January 1 are \$5,546,000 pounds against \$5,750,000 last year; receipts \$6,720,000, against \$5,928,000."

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LOCK MESSANGER IN TRUNK AND LOOT SAFE OF THE EXPRESS CAR

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 10.—Attracted by muffled cries from the express car attached to a local Chicago Rock Island & Pacific train, railway employees tonight found the express messenger, William Abring, locked in a trunk, bound and gagged, and the safe in the express car looted.

The discovery was made when the train reached Little Rock from Hot Springs at 10 o'clock. It is estimated that between \$2,000 and \$3,000 was obtained by the two men who, Abring asserts, took possession of the car near Haskell, Ark., thirty miles from Little Rock, and forced him into the trunk. Other members of the train crew knew nothing of the robbery until the messenger was discovered in the trunk.

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YATES REFUTES STATEMENTS

In Message to Sloan, Denies Omaha Asked Preference.

DISPATCH READ IN THE HOUSE

Max Baehr of St. Paul Given Transfer to Berlin, Switzerland.

After Long Service in Cuban Post.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Special Telegram.—The assertion made in debate on the floor of the house yesterday that banks were given an opportunity by the organization committee of the Omaha reserve to express their preference with reference to the districts within which they would like to be located under the new currency system brought out a wealth of details today, and none stronger than from Congressman Sloan of Nebraska, who secured the floor to dispute the statement.

Not having the necessary data at hand yesterday when the subject was under discussion, Mr. Sloan last night wired Henry W. Yates and asked him to confirm, if true, the statement made to state their preference in order that he might enlighten the house if a misstatement had been made.

Today Mr. Sloan having succeeded in obtaining time read a telegram from Mr. Yates in which that veteran banker absolutely refutes the assertion made by those upholding the organization committee that any opportunity whatsoever was given interested persons to indicate where they would like to have regional banks located or their boundaries.

Mr. Yates in the telegram read on the floor by Mr. Sloan said:

"No opportunity whatever was given the banks to express preference concerning either boundaries or reserve cities after the districts were fixed. When Nebraska was tied up with a slice of western Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and a slice of Texas, Omaha could not expect to be named as the reserve city; it was fixed for Kansas City alone."

"The outrage lies in putting us into such a district, with which we have little in common and where a higher interest rate has prevailed and the business methods pursued are entirely different. About \$100,000,000 of Nebraska money must be placed in that bank whether used by Nebraska people or not."

Mr. Sloan called attention to the fact that Missouri, the sixteenth state in the union in the number of banks within its boundaries expressing a preference before the organization committee, was given two regional banks; that Nebraska had 22 banks expressing a preference and 118 banks expressing a preference, and getting two, also pointing out that New York with 60 banks expressing a preference, Pennsylvania with 46, Illinois with 49 and Ohio with 34 were given one regional bank each.

Darby to Switzerland.

Max J. Baehr of St. Paul, Neb., now United States consul at Cienfuegos, was nominated today as consul at Berne, Switzerland.

He was in Des Moines yesterday in company with other officers of the Illinois Traction company and went over the proposition with members of the Chamber of Commerce.

President E. G. Schmidt of the local street railway has returned from Chicago, where he conferred with owners of the company over the proposed franchise which he is to submit to the city council here as a substitute for the one offered by Mayor Hanna last summer.

Iowa News Notes.

IDA GROVE—Ed Roberts, a prominent young farmer, was married to Miss Alice Clark, who came 5,000 miles from England to become his wife. They will live on a farm northwest of here.

IDA GROVE—The Ida County bank at Ida Grove has taken a national charter and is now the First National Bank of Ida Grove. W. J. Johns, one of the most prominent citizens of Ida Grove, is president; William Schmidt, vice president, and F. H. Schlichter, cashier.

IDA GROVE—It is announced that the 300 head of Hereford, 100 famous blooded inbred, northeast of here, owned by A. C. Cook, will be sold next week at auction prior to the breaking up of the ranch. This has been one of the best places of Iowa for years.

CRISTON—Kit Cooper is on trial in Union county district court for the crime of assault with intent to commit murder. This criminal action, which has been continued for two terms, was called for trial immediately upon the reconvening of court this morning. An indictment was returned at that time.

After Cooper was arrested, four decrees of divorce have been granted since the term opened Monday night.

Congressman Lobeck today received a large box containing 13 petitions, aggregating 1,240 signatures of voters in the Second Nebraska district asking Mr. Lobeck's support in opposition to the Hobson amendment to the constitution establishing a national bank.

The big bunch of protests against the Hobson amendment will be laid before the house judiciary committee having the Hobson constitutional amendment under consideration.

Congressman Lobeck is in New York today and speaks tonight before the Swedish Chamber of Commerce at a meeting held for the purpose of furthering a movement for the establishment of a new fast ocean steamship line between Sweden and the United States. He will return tomorrow morning.

DUBUC IN FORM, REDS' ERRORS COSTLY; TIGERS WIN
