The salary paid at Wesleyan to its chancellor is the same as is paid to the president of the Kearney Normal school, \$3,000. Members of the board of trustees of the university say that it would be impossible to increase the salary, even to keep so valuable a man as Chancellor Fulmer, while the State Normal board is prepared to ruise the salary at the Kearmey achool to \$3,000 if it is necessary. Some of the members of the State Normal board were in receipt of letters this marning from some of the kearney people who had opposed the retirement of President A. O. Thomas, congratulating them on the selection of Chancellor Fulmer, so in case the chancellor decides to accept the offer he will be received heartily by the friends of Dr. Thomas.
