Governor Will Officially Start Low Cost Exhibit Thursday. BURBANK MATERIALS ARRIVE Will Be in Place in One Time—Many Outsiders Planning to Visit Omaha During Progress of the Show.

Governor Morehead has accepted the invitation to open the Low Cost of Living show this evening and has wired the committee in charge that he will arrive on an afternoon train. He will be the official guest at the banquet, which will be given at the Rome hotel just before the opening ceremonies. The Luther Burbank exhibit has arrived and is being rapidly put in place. It will be all ready by Thursday evening. The following members of the executive committee are in charge of the banquet: E. E. Wise, president; B. J. Reed, F. W. Flodman, C. V. Warfield, F. Hannegan, J. E. Kirk, vice presidents; F. H. Hansen, secretary, and R. P. Winkleman, treasurer. Charles Junod of the Omaha Commercial club will be present and will represent the club at the banquet. J. L. McCague, from the executive committee of the club will also be present. W. R. Watson and Joseph Polcar, of the Omaha dailies; Richard Thompson, president of the Associated Retailers; Dr. G. E. Condra, from the conservation department of the University of Nebraska; Mayor James H. Dahlgren, H. H. Baldrie, William L. Holman and L. W. Buckley, manager of the show, are also included in the guest list.

Many Visitors Coming. During the last few days over twenty letters have been received from various commercial clubs and retail grocery associations, who state that they are planning to visit the Low Cost of Living show some evening and that they are making special plans to boost the show in their own towns. Mrs. J. B. Biras of the social sciences department of the Omaha Women's club, who has charge of the Baby Health contest, has been besieged by a number of club women to help her in caring for the babies who are to be entered in the contest. More than fifty members of the Omaha Women's club will assist Mrs. Biras in looking after the details of the baby show, and a number of physicians have also promised their aid in making the affair a success.

Move Show Office. The show management has moved its offices from the McCague building, where they have been for the last three months, to the Auditorium, and all business in connection with the show will be transacted from the Auditorium offices until the finish of the show.

Scandinavian Get-Together night will be one of the big nights at the show. Most of the Scandinavian societies in the city are planning to attend the show on this night, and it will be a splendid opportunity for the various Swedish and Danish organizations to get together. The "Danica" and "Nordica" societies, two of the largest Scandinavian organizations, called a special meeting Monday to make special plans for the occasion. A. L. Undeland, Colonel S. F. Nebel and F. W. Flodman are the committee in charge of this event and are working to get the support of all the smaller Swedish and Danish organizations in boosting for this affair.

The street cleaning department has found that billboards are a hindrance in several cases and that behind them unsanitary dump grounds have been established. These will be ordered cleaned and the billboards will be taken down.

May Stop the Sale of Near-Beer at Place Without a License

Police Commissioner A. C. Kugel has asked the city legal department to define his authority to deal with dispensers of "near beer," following complaints that the Leluy Brewing company is selling "Temp-Brew" at sixteenth and California streets, a place for which the city council would grant no saloon license. Chief of Police Dunn has exhibits of

the "Temp-Brew," which, he says, has been sold in large quantities, as beer would be. The Leluy people assert the brew is not intoxicating. "There ought to be a means of stopping the sale of such stuff," said Chief of Police Dunn. "I think a \$2,000 a year license ought to be required of any dealer who sells near beer."
