Wheat is Considerably Strengthened at Chicago.

HEAVY BUYING IS THE CAUSE Activity of Duluth and Canadian Exporters in Covering Their Hedges Brings About a Re-

action in Values.

OMAHAR, April 16, 1914. The strengthening influence in the wheat market at Chicago yesterday ame particularly from an unfavorable rop report sent there from Atchison. Can., by John Inglis, who said that wheat wheat. fields that were pastured closely are los-ing color and that timely rains are needed; that disced-in wheat is going back rapidly and that complaints are coming mainly from Ness county, Kan-sas. Outside of this report the conditions were said to be favorable throughout the

entire winter wheat section.

The leading strengthening factor in wheat was the heavy buying of May by Canadian and Duluth exporters, who hedged their cash wheat in Chicago some to sell their cash wheat, save when the grain was placed on bargain counters. Winnipeg reported a big lot of wheat sold at a price named by the buyer-which was quite low.

The situation in wheat is abnormal. Crop prospects promise a record yield: there is a good visible supply and the cash markets of the entire country are fiat. Advices received here yesterday from Philadelphia, Boston, Baitimore and New York were all alike insofar as any export trade is concerned. These advices all pronounced cash wheat at a standstill. At Chicago the only sale of cash wheat yesterday was 10,000 bushels to millers. to millers.

The smaller receipts of wheat in all positions attracted general attention of the speculative world, and some wheat was bought on the falling off of the receipts of winter wheat and spring wheat. There were contradictory reports received from Kansas as to crop prospects. A miller of Marion county in that state wired that wheat is deteriorating rapidly and that the condition of the growing plant is not over 70. There were two other messages from Marion county which said that the wheat was in good shape and prospects are good for a big crop. Seeding is progressing in the appling wheat country.

The near by corn futures were strong and world higher, while the deferred months were unchanged to 1/2 lower. Shorts in the May future were covering and they bid the price up until the demand was satisfied. On the other hand, the holders of July and September were offering corn at lower levels.

Some of the strength shown in the May yesterday was based on talk of larger cuarters for corn to go out of here at the opening of navigation or early in May. While this talk was not confirmed, it had the effect of advancing prices. The longs in May corn doubtless have full control at the present time.

A message from Buffalo reported the eastern trade as taking advantage of any break in corn or oats, and they have beught quite freely the last few days.

Oats would doubtless have proved a weak market had it not been for the help of wheat and corn.

Liquidation in hog products was general and free, and there was some bear pressure from packers who sold July deliveries. Shorts were the principal buyers in order to secure profits.

There was little trade in way of investment buying. From the action of market a readjustment of values is likely to be seen.

Argentine corn. capturing consumers farther north daily from the gulf and faisher west from the Atlantic, made the burden of holders severe, especially in the May option, with settlements only a fortnight off, and no ready outlet in sight for the millions of bushels on hand in Chicago. The shutdown of a corn industry at St. Louis and the expected closing of another at Pekin, Ill., were additional sources of weakness.

Wheat was depressed by the break in corn, and by prospects for showers over the greater part of the spring and winter belts, notably western Kansas. Lower cables and a forecast of heavier shipments from Russia counted also in favor of the bears. Increasing talk of danger from Hessian fix tended somewhat to check soiling. In the oats crowd, active covering by shorts held prices comparatively steady.


