BAUMGARDNER IS TAKEN OUT

CHICAGO, April 18.—The Chicago Americans won their fifth straight game of the season today when they defeated St. Louis, 5 to 3.

The visitors took a lead of a run with the aid of Weaver's error and a hit, but the score was tied when Chase reached first on a muffed third strike, stole second, took third on Cronin's wild throw and scored on Collins' hit.

In the seventh, Scott walked two men and Leary tripped, scoring both the visitors and again putting them in the lead. Daily singled in Chicago's half and scored on a triple by Demmitt, who reported today to the local club, having been released by Detroit at the waiver price. Demmitt formerly was a member of the Montreal club in the International league.

Secretary of National League Plans New Record Keeping.

HEYDLER TO IMPROVE DATA

For the Sake of Reference Every Man that Plays in Major Nines Will Be Tabulated for Work Done.

NEW YORK, April 18.—John Heydler, secretary of the National league, is contemplating further improvements in the averages he yearly compiles and issues. This improvement is the printing of the records of the players who take part in less than fifteen games, these records being kept every year, but never made public.

Sporting editors whose papers make a specialty of answering questions about the national statistics will applaud Heydler's determination of printing the records of the limited opportunity class, no one connected with base ball, not even Heydler himself, having an idea who it was that made the rule that a player wasn't to get a record unless he took part in fifteen games.

One hundred and twenty-five noble athletes were denied records by the National league's able secretary last season because he failed to precede and didn't take any cognizance of the men who participated in less than fifteen games.

When They Were Recorded. According to guide books, the first year Christy Mathewson was in the National league was in 1903, but really "Big Six" broke into fast company in 1905. "Rube" Marquard gets into the guides for the first time as a National leaguer in 1909, and is not in them at all in 1913.
