Salvation Army to Mobilize Forces at Panama Exposition

More than 100,000 members of the Salvation Army from forty-six countries will assemble in San Francisco between August 15 and 22, 1915, at a convention of the International Salvation Army and will be personally directed by General Bramwell Booth, who will lead his army in the active field at the exposition Major Fletcher Agnew of Chicago, who has been appointed Salvation Army secretary to the exposition, is preparing to receive the members attending the convention and is agranging for a huge Salvation Army exhibit, the principal feature of which will be an open air meeting three times daily, when leaders from every country with native bands will entertain the crowds.

Major Agnew will leave San Francisco for the June convention in London when the program of the convention in San Francisco in 1915 will be finally announced.

The Salvation Army's exhibit, which will be one of the most interesting of the exhibits at the exposition, will be placed in the department of social economy.

Panama Expo Gossip. The gate keepers of the Panama-Paci-fic International exposition are in a quandary over the possibility of an aerial turnstile. Aviators flying across San Francisco bay enter the grounds at will. Francisco bay enter the grounds at will.

The crection of a New York state pavilien at the Fanama-Pacific exposition grounds at San Francisco is progressing. It is expected that all of the carpenter work will be completed in two months. Experiments are being made at the grounds of the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco to determine the extent to which it will be advisable to use fireless fireworks, giving imitations of water falls in the day time by gold and silver showers.

The New Jersey pavilion at the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco will be in the shape of a letter "H." with a frontage of 215 feet and a width of 157 feet. The southern court will be decorated with a flower garden and a liberty pole. In the northern court will be a relief map, illustrating the canal system of New Jersey.

The parapet will serve the double purpose of a bulkhead and a decorative feature. It will be 1,000 feet long and three feet high, and will be ornamented with pedestals and brilliantly illuminated. The timbers of the atructure, which will cost \$6,000, will be made to resemble Travertine marble.

Argentine Farmers Will Exhibit Corn and Farm Products

More than 9,000 square feet of space have been reserved for the Armentine farmers in the palace of agriculture, the targer part of which will be devoted to Argentine Farmers the exhibition of wheat and corn. The Argentine exports more chilled ment and more corn than any other country in the world. Its wheat production is second only to that of Russis, and wool second only to Australia. The exhibit of cattle and sheep from the Argentine will be one of the most interesting in the live stock epartment of the exposition.

A large space has been taken by the Argentine in the palace of education and social economy, where the exhibit will show Argentine's system of compulsory voting, of the management of government owned railways, of train systems, parcels post, and other public utilities. In addition there will be shown the model schools, for which the Argentine government apporpriated last year \$60,000,000 gold. A special exhibit will be made iljustrating the method in which Argentine handles immigration and its paternal treatment of immigrants who are received as guests of the government and lodged at the government hotel until they which they are suited.
