Nebraska. NEBRASKA FIGHTERS READY

Former Military Men Offer Services Under the Colors.

BARTON ANSWERS APPEAL

Fifth District Congressman Praises Militiamen for Their Promptness in Responding to Need of the Hour.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 24.—(Special.)—In the event that war is declared against Mexico it is evident that Nebraska and Nebraska soldiers will be doing their part in bringing about a different condition in that country and that the fighting spirit which made the First Nebraska a factor in subduing the Philippines will continue among those who compose the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth regiments of Nebraska's quota of troops.
So far about 600 letters received by Adjutant General Hall from men who at some time have been identified with the National Guard of the state or have seen service in some of the late conflicts, offering their services to the state if needed, show the patriotic spirit which seems to pervade the state. Added to this over forty towns have made application for authority to form companies.
Albion Men on Hand.
This morning L. N. Watson and E. D. Lehr, first lieutenant and first sergeant of the company at Albion, which was mustered out about a year ago, called at the office of Adjutant General Hall and asked the privilege of again getting into the service with a company from that town. Albion for fifteen years had a company in the guard and was the home of Colonel Fred J. Mack of the old Second regiment, and Colonel C. G. Barna, surgeon general of the guard and now a member of the staff of Governor Morehead. A recruiting office will be opened today on a morning sent by Mr. Watson to former Captain F. F. Willott at that place.
Other men who have seen service in the Spanish-American war have been calling at headquarters all the morning. Among these were two men from Brady, who had seen service in the Philippines. They desired to organize a troop of cavalry or to offer their services as mounted scouts. Just what chance there may be for them the general did not know at this time.
Barton Sends Message.
Colonel John G. Maher is intensely interested in the situation and hopes to be able to head a regiment in case volunteers are called for outside of the state guard. He was assured some time ago by the War department that if troops were called out the militia of the state would have first call, but after that other organizations would be given a chance. Colonel Maher has wired all members of the Nebraska delegation in congress stating that General Hall has three regiments all ready and willing them to use their influence to see that the Nebraska quota is at least three regiments. In response he has received answers from the members of the delegations in the following message, sent by congressman Barton:

"The valor of Nebraskans as proven in the Spanish-American war shows that an individual in the Nebraska National Guard services rendered. Will be proud to render the boys of Nebraska all assistance possible. To the Nebraska National Guard and entire personnel we extend sincere congratulations for your promptness, patriotism and devotion to the flag of our country."

One company has been organized in the territorial jurisdiction at Ord with Captain James F. Finrock. This company will be transferred to the new Sixth regiment.

Pay for Army Service.
Pay for the officers and privates per month who may be called upon in case of war is declared as follows: Brigadier general, \$300; colonel, \$270; lieutenant colonel, \$237.50; major, \$205; captain, \$172.50; first lieutenant, \$139.50; second lieutenant, \$106.50. These officers have to furnish their own uniforms and subsistence.
Non-commissioned officers and privates receive: First sergeant, \$6; quartermaster and other sergeants, \$5 each; corporals, \$3 each; privates, \$15 each. In case of war or service outside of the United States these receive an additional 50 per cent.

McKissick Files for Commissioner of Public Lands
BEATRICE, Neb., April 24.—(Special.)—J. W. McKissick of this city Thursday entered the race for commissioner of public lands and buildings, paid his filing fee and sent his papers to the secretary of the state asking that his name be placed on the ballot for the democratic nomination for the office. Mr. McKissick represented Gage county in the last legislature, and for some time it has been reported that he intended to enter the race for governor.
R. N. Fulton Thursday filed with the county clerk his papers asking that his name be placed on the ballot for the democratic nomination for sheriff at the primaries next August. He is the first man to file for this office.

OIL FIND IN MACPHERSON PRONOUNCED GENUINE

STAPLETON, Neb., April 24.—(Special.)—Reports of the finding of oil in the central part of MacPherson county still continue to come in through the different sources. Some rumors that the strike of oil near Tryon was a myth gained some currency, but these have been shown to have had no foundation and the strike of oil is apparently genuine. The product from the well, three miles southwest of the county seat of MacPherson county has been analyzed and pronounced genuine oil. There has been other deposits of oil found on the Dickey Bros' ranch, twenty miles west of Tryon, in the lake region of MacPherson county, and while this find has not been substantiated as thoroughly as the other, there is every evidence to prove that the product is the real thing.

Burglars Bait at Ravenna.

RAVENNA, Neb., April 24.—(Special.)—Ravenna had a lively experience with burglars last night, two residences and two saloons being entered. Apparently the first place visited was the home of Mayor Carl Linn. No one was awakened and the only thing taken was a valuable gold watch belonging to Mr. Linn. At the home of J. A. Clark entrance was also gained through a window. Mrs. Clark and three small children were alone. Mr. Clark being in Omaha. When Mrs. Clark was awakened the man with a warning "h-h-h" quickly left through an open window. Apparently while the policeman was in the residence part of town the burglar entered the saloons belonging to Ed Stanton and Lew Vesely, breaking the glass in the door of each place. About \$5 in small change was taken from the saloons.

A stranger who was starting to walk out of town to the east was arrested during the forenoon. He was unable to give an account of his whereabouts during the night and had on his person an amount of nickels and other small change corresponding with the amount taken from the saloons. He will be held for investigation.

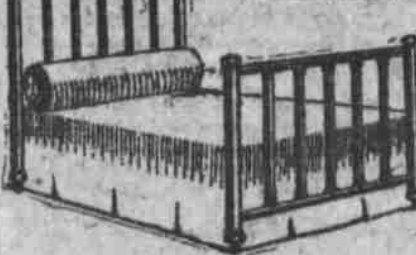
