DAHLMAN FOR POSTMASTER

Peace is Said to Have Been Established to That Extent.

W. J. BRYAN FAVORS THE IDEA

Hitchcock is Also Said to Be in on the Deal to Repay the Dahlman Democracy for Past Favors.

Peace! Not only has Bryan been busy trying to make peace with Horta, but a recent breath of peace political gossip from Washington gives it straight from the shoulder that peace has been made with James C. Dahlman and that Dahlman is not to run for congress from the Second district after all.

"Come to think of it," said a local democrat when he was told the report, "I don't recall hearing anything lately about the candidacy of Dahlman for congress." It is a big peace coalition, according to the direct gossip from the east. It embodies as many "powers" as did the European coalition once formed against the great Napoleon. But it is simple after all. Dahlman, so the Washington gossip has it, is to be taken care of at last by being made postmaster in Omaha: Bryan is said to agree to it because he wants to discharge some past obligations to Mayor Jim.

Hitchcock favors Plan. Hitchcock is said to be in favor of it, because the Dahlman democracy shouted as loudly for Hitchcock for the senate as they did for Dahlman for governor when the two were running at the same time.

Loebek, yes, Charles Otto Loebek, is said to be in favor of it. Why not? Does not the coalition shove James C. Dahlman out of Loebek's way in the democratic primaries for the congressional nomination?

And James C. Dahlman. Does he favor it? Oh well, he has been heard to say, "Yes, the postmastership would look pretty good for a few years."

Now as to obligations. Bryan has not forgotten how James C. Dahlman carried his big check book when he was with the Bryan train in Maryland and through the east when Bryan was campaigning in 1900. James C. Dahlman was fresh from Chadron at that time. He had money. He was a national committee

President Joy of the Association to Be Here in May.

MARKINGS FOR THE HIGHWAY

WALDRON URGES ACTIVITY

Wants it So that There Will Be No Misunderstanding as to Where Highway Runs Through Villages.

Omaha is likely to be favored with a visit from Henry B. Joy, president of the Lincoln Highway association, some time in May. H. B. Waldron, state consul of the Lincoln Highway for Nebraska, has received word that President Joy is to make an ocean-to-ocean trip over the highway in the latter part of May. This will be an inspection tour. State Consul Waldron is anxious that Nebraska shall make as good a showing as possible when the big chief comes through here.

For this reason he is urging the county and town consuls throughout the state to see that the road as already laid out is well marked with the Lincoln Highway sign painted on the poles in the official manner. Through the towns and cities of the state especially Mr. Waldron is urging that the road be well marked, so that there be no mistake in any of the towns as to which street coincides with the Lincoln Highway.

In speaking of the situation, Mr. Waldron said: "I know of no better way at the present time for the people of the state to show an interest in the Lincoln Highway than to see to it that the road is well marked; in fact, so well marked that it would be impossible for any one to lose his way, day or night, in order to do this, it is necessary to have the highway road markers on a large number of telegraph and telephone poles or other suitable places."

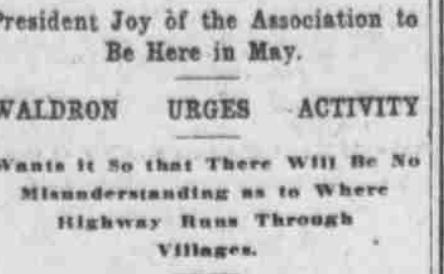
