Nebraska. STARK TELLS ABOUT SALUTES Former Judge Advocate Writes Letter to the Governor.

PRECEDENT FOR WILSON'S ACT Discloses Where President Lincoln Once Ordered Salute to Brazilian Flag After Capture of Cruiser.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 28.—(Special.)—The history and law covering the salute to the flag, has been given in a letter written by W. L. Stark, at one time officier in the Nebraska National Guard holding the position of judge advocate with the rank of major, to Governor Morehead and received today.

Under international law, a salute to the flag is defined as the public acknowledgment of an apology, made to the country, whose flag is saluted. A flag salute is nothing unprecedented in American history. Our navy was required in 1842 to fire a salute in honor of Brazil, by order of President Lincoln.

The facts of the Tampico incident seem to put the Huerta government in the wrong. The foreign minister's declaration that there was no insult to the United States flag because the flag was carried by Dolphin's boat is obviously untrue.

Secretary Prepares Removal Proposition

LINCOLN, April 30.—(Special.)—After considerable discussion covering the manner in which the university removal proposition should go on the ballot Secretary of State Wait has fixed upon the following as the proper way to fix it:

(a) "Shall all the A crosses in the colleges of the state square, 3 1/4, university, except the votes for residence of medicine from 0 x 1 to be consolidated as farm." 304

(b) "Shall the col- A cross in the legs of the state uni-square, 3 1/4, verity, except the col-votes against legs of medicine from 0 x 1 to 306 and medicine, be state farm, housed in buildings located on the present city campus and on land contiguous thereto." 300

All propositions to be voted on at the election have to be numbered, the affirmative taking the even numbers and the negative the odd numbers. The secretary of state has started the numbering at 300.
