

MOSS IS DENIED REHEARING

Judge English Declines Against Trial of Injured Youth's Case.

NOW IN A LOCAL HOSPITAL

Stump of Leg Cut Off by Missouri Pacific Train is Undergoing Treatment to Avoid Complications.

Refusal to allow a rehearing of the case of little Ralph Moss, whose attorneys are fighting to secure for him the right of a jury trial, has been entered on the docket by District Judge English.

Ralph, who is 7 years old, was run down by a train last November, and his leg cut off above the knee. Two amputations were performed in Wise Memorial hospital, and his physician called the case "the luckiest boy in Omaha" and said his courage saved his life.

Suit for \$3,000 was begun in Ralph's behalf against the Missouri Pacific, but soon after he left the hospital, his father was paid \$1,000 by Attorney J. A. C. Kennedy, the railroad's lawyer, to dismiss the boy's suit and his own cause of action.

Since that time a warm legal fight has been waged to set aside the settlement and secure for Ralph a trial by jury. Judge English has twice sustained the action of Attorney Kennedy, and the case will now be taken to the supreme court.

A. J. Conrad, speaking to the Southeast Improvement club, said: "There is inefficiency in the water office. It may not be due to the inability of clerks to do the work, but the system used is wrong. It is not up to date. Go there and ask for information and you wait half an hour before you get it."

"It is not the way with private corporations. They have information at hand. There are no delays and there are fewer mistakes."

Some of the inefficiency, it is charged, is due to the frequent shift of clerks, who, should they be retained for a year, under the law could not be fired without a hearing.
