Among those who are planning to attend the biennial convention of the Federation of Women's Clubs, which will be held in Chicago in June, are Mesdames C. W. Hayes, N. H. Nelson, L. J. Hensley, Mrs. Edward Phelan, who will be accompanied by her daughter, Miss Helen; L. M. Lord, C. H. Marley, E. R. Hume and Dr. Sarah Millen, all members of the Women's club, and Mrs. Charles J. Johnson of the Woman's club of the railway mail service.

The Omaha Woman's club had adopted resolutions calling for reform in the extreme dress fashions for women, and for the establishment of a bureau of textiles in the national government, to prevent the adulteration that is so prevalent. These resolutions will be forwarded to the biennial convention and action will be taken on them, as the movement is country-wide. Many are discussing the probability of the convention taking action on the suffrage question.

Mrs. N. M. Graham, president of the industrial committee of the state federation, read an interesting paper on "Hot Lunches for School Children" before the Second district meeting at Papillon. The South Omaha Woman's club is contemplating establishing this system next fall in the Westside school and if it proves successful, will extend it to all the schools. Forty-five cities have already adopted the work. Mrs. Graham's paper was voted to be sent to the bureau of reciprocity.

Miss Mary Lunn of Sioux City, prominent settlement worker, will address the meeting of the Deaconess Aid society of the Methodist churches on Tuesday afternoon, in the chapel of the Methodist hospital. The Deaconess Aid society is interested in the establishment of a social settlement on the south side.

The social science department of the Omaha Woman's club has been forced to postpone its meeting until Monday, May 11, because of inability to secure the club rooms for this Monday. Reports will be received and officers elected for the coming year. The work of the Baby show, which was conducted by this department, and its effect, will be discussed.
