Where a decree was rendered under sections \$774, \$782, inc., R. S. 1912, declaring certain property a public nuisance and enjoining the owner and occupant thereof from further illegal acts and no appeal is taken therefrom, upon appeal from further provisions of the decree ordering the furniture, etc., removed and the building effectually closed for a year, that portion of the decree not appealed from is a final adjudication as to the existence of the nuisance.

In a proceeding for an injunction and to abate a nuisance under said section where it is shown that persons not parties to the suit are the owners of the furniture in the building, the court is without jurisdiction to order the furniture to be removed and sold. In such a case the owners of the property sought to be seized should be made parties defendant to the action.
