

CHICAGO BUYS OMAHA WHEAT

Buyers from Windy City Pay High Price for May Delivery.

OMAHA DEALERS CLEAN UP

Good Profit is Made on Large Amount of Wheat Which Was Bought Earlier in the Season.

So far as cash wheat transactions were concerned Monday was one of the big days in the history of the Omaha Grain exchange. Monday Chicago swooped down upon the Omaha grain market and bought up 500,000 bushels of wheat for delivery this month, the prices ranging around 84 1/2 to 87 cents. It was grain bought early in the season and at prices considerably lower, thus enabling the Omaha men to clean up a nice profit. The grain bought by the Chicago men is to fill orders and has already begun to load out. Here it is in storage.

While the Omaha grain receipts are light at this time, owing to farmers being busy in their fields and not taking time to haul away their grain, they are fully up to the other markets, being thirty-nine cars of wheat, sixty of corn and twenty-four of oats Monday.

Chicago, that gathers its supply of grain from all the primary markets of the United States, Monday received but forty-three cars of wheat, thirty-five of corn and eighty-four of oats, while Kansas City received but thirty-nine cars of wheat, fifty of corn and fourteen of oats. On wheat Monday the Kansas City price was below Omaha, there the May price being 84 1/2 to 85 cents.

Little Tot Will Let No One but His Mother Hold Him

The plaintiff alleges that as a result of the actions of her father-in-law and mother-in-law George Kriebe, her husband, left her less than a month after the birth of Harold. The father Mr. Kriebe is a wealthy Sarpy county farmer. Mrs. Kriebe testified that on the evening of the day they were married at Audubon, Ia., June 12, 1911, her mother-in-law insisted on selecting the hotel room which the bride and groom were to occupy. When they went in live for a time at the Krieb farms south of South Omaha, she asserted her mother-in-law and father-in-law slept in the same room occupied by herself and her husband.

Garden Beyond the Sandhills is Shown in a Neat Booklet

Arah L. Hungerford of Crawford has issued a catalogue of western homes, which he calls "the garden beyond the sandhills," and which, profusely illustrated, gives a vivid impression of the opportunities awaiting western Nebraska farmers. "Please, judge, won't you let my papa come back to mamma and me?" 8-year-old Lorraine Margaret Pierson asked of Police Judge Foster in court. She and her mother told the court that they wanted Guy W. Pierson, the head of the family, to have another chance. The man was charged with wife and child abandonment and was bound over to the district court. Probation officers, with relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Pierson, have already taken steps to secure Pierson's release under \$2,000 bond, so he can care for his family. Prosecution may be dropped as the result of the wife's attitude. Pierson admitted in court that he had gone to Kansas City and met Cleo Smith, 22 years of age, whose parents live in South Omaha. The woman was also arrested, but has been released.

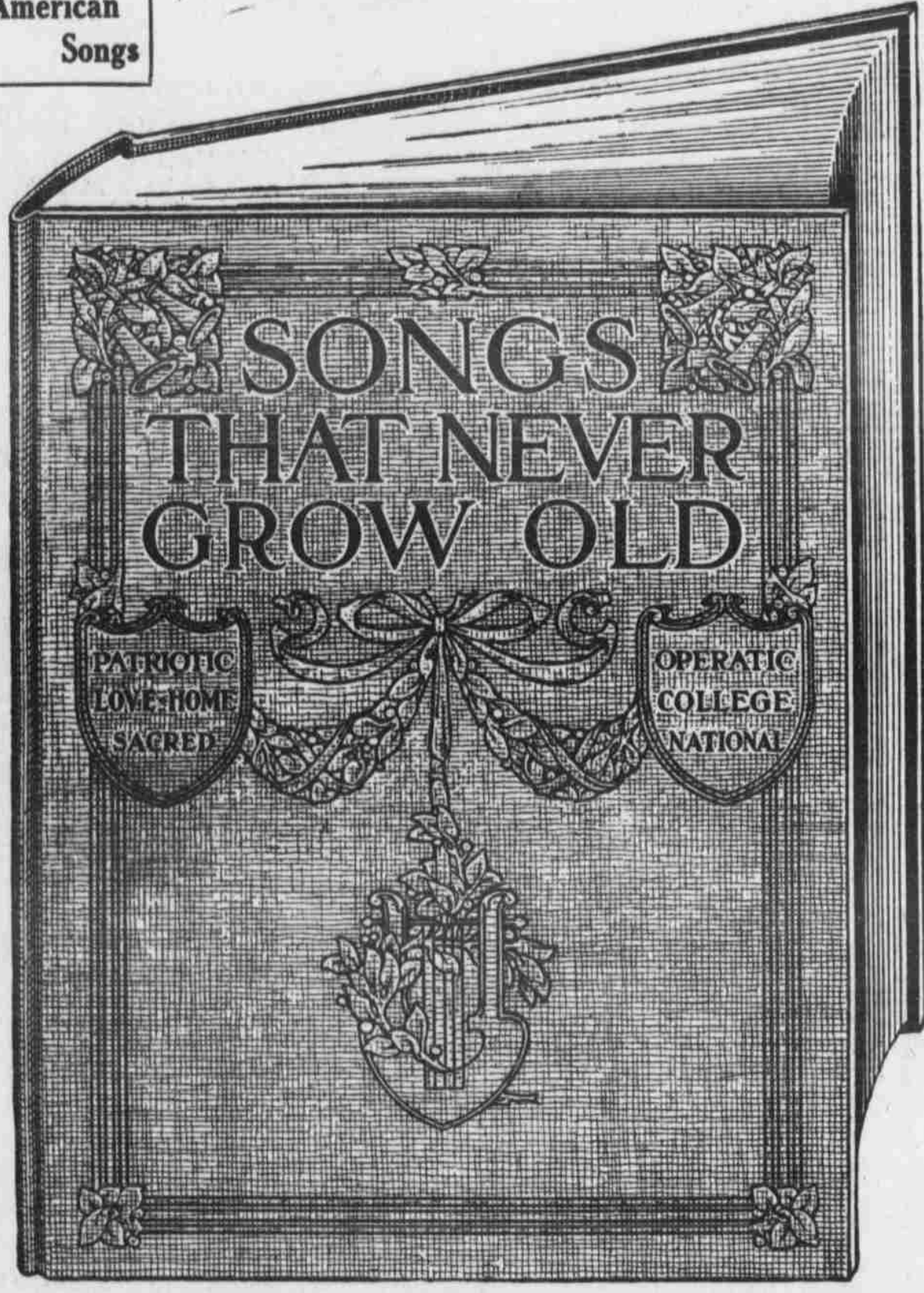
