THREE PITCHERS BATTED OUT

SIoux CITY, Ia., May 6.—(Special Telegram)—Sioux City made it four straight today by pounding three Omaha pitchers out of the box before Stevenson was finally called in to stop the Indian artillery. 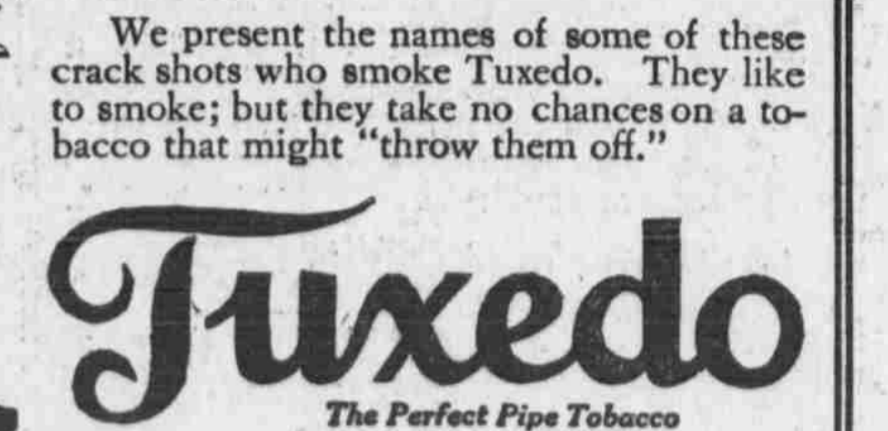
FRISBIE WINS AGAIN
