James Patten's Message Helps Out Corn Situation.

ARGENTINE CANCELS ORDERS

South American Republic Not Prepared to Make Shipments as Early as Bargained For—Asks to Be Released.

OMAHA, May 6, 1914. Although "Jim" Patten's message from New York yesterday, a message from him carried great weight and helped not only to advance the price of corn at Chicago, but to hold it at the higher levels reached. Advice from him to his house-

Philadelphia reported the charter of a full cargo of Argentine corn to come to Chicago. Wheat showed more strength than any in the list and closed steady and unchanged, while the deferred months were a feature of the market. The wheat market was the heavy selling of July by the Armour Grain company, followed by other commission houses in the trade. This wheat was largely by speculators and cash handlers, as it is generally believed the deliveries of wheat in July will be of enormous proportions.

Oats held up in strength yesterday because of the advance in corn, and with the lighter offerings in the pit and the better cash demand, \$10.00 bushels selling here for shipment. Provisions were fractionally better yesterday on the continued light hog movement, coupled with the strength in corn. One of the large shippers, a moderate buyer of July yard, which was a conspicuous feature in the early dealings. Cash corn was unchanged. Cash oats were 1c higher.

Clearances of wheat and flour were 305,000 bu. of corn, none oats, 100 bu. At Liverpool wheat closed 49 3/4 and higher and corn 4d higher.

Primary receipts were 400,000 bu. and shipments 73,000 bu., against receipts of 300,000 bu. and shipments of 125,000 bu. last week.

Primary corn receipts were 34,000 bu. and shipments 33,000 bu., against receipts of 32,000 bu. and shipments of 30,000 bu. last week.

Primary oats receipts were 43,000 bu. and shipments 50,000 bu., against receipts of 47,000 bu. and shipments of 50,000 bu. last week.

CHICAGO, May 6.—Chances of a decided advance in the corn market were both on the Minnesota and the Dakota sides, had much to do today with bringing about a steady advance. 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being more than 1,000 head heavier than last year ago. After two dull days in the shipping market, prices opened up in the morning. Shippers and speculators were out early buying such hogs as suited them freely at prices that were 1/2c higher than yesterday. As was the case Tuesday packers early bids were not much higher than yesterday's. The market strengthened slightly and after the first round offers showed an advance of 1/2c. Most of the bids being made around \$3.00, as against yesterday's \$2.75 market. Sellers, believing that they ought to get at least a nickel better, moved to trade at the prices offered by buyers and as a result the trade was brisker than at the opening, and with the exception of the shipper's purchase nothing much was said until the close of the day. In the end, however, it became apparent that the shippers had made up their minds to buy hogs at \$3.00 and the bulk of the market was finally started seaward most of them moved at this figure. Taking the market as a whole, the day was a success, and a shade to be higher. The big end of the sales landed at \$3.00 with a sprinkling up to \$3.25.
