

DEMOCRATS ARE DESPERATE

Friends of Maguire Seeking to Induce Morehead to Change Mind.

WANT TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR

They Fear Strength Maher May Develop in Triangular gubernatorial Fight with Bryan and Berge.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 10.—(Special.)—That a desperate condition exists in the democratic party today is made evident by another attempt to convince Governor Morehead that he should go back to his election promise not to accept another term as governor.

Since the governor has come out for congress there has been a big effort made by the friends of Congressman Maguire to get the governor to change his mind and make a try for the democratic nomination for governor. There is method in the madness of these persons for several reasons. With the governor in the race for the democratic nomination for congress, the Maguire men understand that the little congressman will stand no show of getting the nomination. They want him out of the way and they want him in the gubernatorial fight because they fear the strength which Colonel John G. Maher may develop in a three-cornered fight with Charles W. Bryan and George W. Berge, dividing the dry vote, and Colonel Maher getting the wet support. They figure that if they can coax the governor back into the race that there is a much better show for Maguire to land the congressional nomination and the Bryan and Berge followers know that their chances will be made better with the governor drawing support which under ordinary circumstances would go to Maher.

Will Make Vigorous Effort.

It is expected that this week a very vigorous effort will be made by the Bryan-Berge-Maguire faction to coax the governor to give up his congressional aspirations and seek again with a second term as governor. Of course, Bryan and Berge will stay out of the negotiations personally, but their friends will do the talking. However, the governor appears to have a pretty good line on the situation. He recognizes very well that with the present split up condition of the democratic party in the state there is no certainty that he could be elected to a second term as governor if he was nominated. When he looks over the election figures of two years ago he discovers that he polled more votes in the first congressional district for governor than Maguire did for congress by 1,110. In fact, he received more votes in every county than did Maguire, the records showing that he won a majority in every county in Lancaster county, Maguire's own home, than did the congressman, the records showing 110 more in cases; 135 in Johnson, thirty-five in Lancaster, 156 in Nemaha, thirty-one in Otoe, forty-six in Pawnee and in Richardson county, the governor's home, he received 50 more votes than Maguire. In studying these figures the governor feels that there is no reason why he should get off of the congressional race track, which looks good to him, and go onto the gubernatorial track, which looks mighty lumpy just now from a democratic standpoint.

Governor Not to Be Fooled.

To the average politician of the democratic brand the fight for a state office looks a great deal like a farce. He looks for any follower of Andrew Johnson at the present time and with the uncertain outlook for the future there is not going to be much crowding around the office of the secretary of state to get a chance to file for a democratic nomination for any state office. Nobody in the state knows the political situation better than Governor Morehead. He doesn't wear a plug hat and a long coat and very often, but his head is working all the time and if the Bryan-Berge-Maguire combination pulls off anything on him they will have to be particularly smooth. The governor might be willing to sacrifice himself for the good of his party, but he is not liable to go into a slaughter to help out the B-B-M outfit.

BEATRICE, Neb., May 10.—(Special.)—Arrangement was received here Friday to the effect that Rock Island trains Nos. 33 and 34, running between Beatrice and Horton, Kan., would be placed on a new schedule on Sunday, May 17, and after that date would be operated between Horton, Kan., and Fairbury. These trains were discontinued west of Beatrice about a year ago, since that time having been laying over here at night and returning to Horton in the morning. Bitter Legal Battle Over O'Connor Estate

HASTINGS, Neb., May 10.—(Special Telegram.)—County Judge Butten today fixed July 10 as the date of hearing heirship claims in the estate of John O'Connor. The property, valued at \$100,000, is claimed by over 100 persons. Within the last two days motions have been filed by various parties to transfer the case to district court, to compel immediate burial of the body of John O'Connor, who died August 17 last and whose body is still in the morgue; to delay burial pending further examination and to secure immediate examination of the body for the purpose of determining whether its lower limbs have been dissected, to ascertain whether the body was permitted to be removed to inside State hospital for X-ray examination, and for the appointment of a special judge by the county supervisors to try heirship claims on the ground that Judge Butten had prejudged the case and is therefore prejudiced.

A dozen or more O'Connors have established residence here pending the outcome of the suit. A long and bitter legal battle is in prospect, the state of Nebraska being one of the parties on the plea that the property should escheat to the state.

Reports of Outrages

From the interior and isolated points reports of attacks and outrages on Americans continue to trickle through the lines, although no first hand accounts have yet been brought in. All travelers coming down from the capital are stripped of newspapers and documents which might reveal the state of affairs there and no news of the American occupation of Vera Cruz, so far as can be prevented by the Mexicans, has been permitted to reach the capital.

While the military situation here remains unchanged, news of the disposition of the Mexican troops between Vera Cruz and Mexico City came in today from a trained observer, who reported that he saw the Sixteenth infantry nearest to the American lines. General Maas' headquarters are at Paso Del Macho, and up the railroad as far as Esperanza he saw the Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth and Twenty-sixth infantry in the order named. Beyond Esperanza regiments of rurales were posted along the line to Mexico City. The number was not estimated, but there was a large guard at each railroad station.

Two Britons and an American Are Killed

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Killing of two British and one American mine official by Mexican federalists near Guadaluajara was reported to the British embassy here late tonight by the British vice consul at Guadaluajara. The report said that G. E. Williams, British foreman of the El Faber mine, and C. B. Hoadley, American, had been killed and Walter Neal, American manager, and Patrick Baird, British, slightly wounded at El Faber. S. H. A. Green, British, was reported killed at San Marcos. The vice consul gave no details, and it was stated at the embassy that all efforts to learn the reason for the attack upon the mine men had been unsuccessful so far.

ected with the American forces that the wounded are being little cared for, chiefly on account of the scarcity in Mexico City of medical supplies. Many who have resided in the capital credit the report that Huerta intends the destruction of the city before his departure, explaining that the man is so obsessed with the idea that he is the only one capable of directing the government that he has become practically irrationally. They regard Mexico City as a place which will soon be as dangerous for Mexicans as for foreigners.

Up to the present no additional American troops have been asked for, beyond those necessary to complete Brigadier General Funston's fifth brigade. Strategists agree, however, that the troops and marines already here will be sufficient for flying columns in a great emergency, while the bluejackets could garrison the city.

German Ships Will Not Land Munitions

was announced that the mobilization was independent of any orders from Washington and was being carried out merely as a test of efficiency. At the Navy department the monitor Ozard was ordered to Tampico. The warship is of light draft and capable of navigating the Panuco river, around which the endangered oil fields are centered, in case of necessity.

Badger's Report

The report received today from Admiral Badger upon conditions in the oil fields in the neighborhood of Tampico is regarded as confirmatory, in some degree, of news that had reached the State department several days ago that American oil men were in danger of losing their property in Mexico because of the suspension of oil production during the long drawn out siege of Tampico. If it can be shown that the leases were prevented from operating their wells through no fault of their own, it is certain the State department will see that in the final settlement which will be made of all the vast number of American claims against Mexico these concessionaries are fully protected in their rights.

Bryan Gratified

Secretary Bryan was gratified at the news he received today from American Consul Rodgers at Havana of the action of the German steamship company in directing the return to Hamburg without unloading of their munitions of war, reported to be on board the steamships Kron Prinzessin Cecilie and Bavaria, which were about to be placed in the hands of the Huerta agents at Puerto Mexico, the only gulf port with railroad communication with the capital through which such supplies could reach the city. The secretary said that so far as he knew this order on the part of the steam-

ship people was voluntary; at any rate he had not himself communicated with the German ambassador here nor with the German government any request that these cargoes be held up.

Undoubtedly the solution of the question reached today relieved the State department from what promised to be an embarrassing situation.

No Warship at Port

With no American warship at Puerto Mexico, and consequently without the means of preventing the landing of those arms and ammunition which might be used against American troops later on, the only feasible method of effective action was an appeal to the German government to stop the delivery. For its part Germany doubtless would have been greatly embarrassed by such a request for the reason that it had no authority to interfere with its own commercial lines in legitimate business, except in time of war, and it is of course known to all European governments that the United States is not ready to admit the existence of such conditions.

Inquiry failed to develop the reasons which actuated the steamship company, but it is assumed that the cargo was taken at the shippers' risk and with a distinct understanding that it would not be landed if the company would thereby be embarrassed with its relations with the United States government. From an unofficial source it was learned that these arms and ammunition, like the cargo on the Ypiranga, turned back at Vera Cruz, were originally shipped from New York or some other eastern port; at any rate that they were of American manufacture and were sent to Hamburg as likely to afford the easiest access to the Mexican gulf ports.

Silliman is Safe

Reassuring information concerning the safety of Vice Consul John R. Silliman, reported arrested by Huerta commanders at Sullito or San Luis Potosi, was received. The State department, which had addressed strong remonstrances to General Huerta on the subject through the Brazilian minister and had been seeking information on his fate through every available channel, received through the French legation in Mexico City a communication from General Blanquet, Huerta's war minister, that the American consulate at Hermosillo was guarded by federal troops and that neither Mr. Silliman north other Americans were under arrest. The movement of refugees from Mexico continued. Sir Lionel Carden, the British representative in Mexico City, again strongly urged his nationals to leave for the coast. His apprehension is connected, it is believed, with supposed dangers to the capital from the forces of Zapata, reports which have been disquieting the foreign diplomats for several days.

Mazatlan Not Surrendered

The campaign between the contending Mexican forces continued, with the usual rumors and denials of the fall of important points. Admiral Howard reported that Mazatlan, on the Pacific coast, had

not surrendered, contrary to reports printed here, but that fighting continued. He also reported that Huerta had ordered the lights in the lighthouses on the Pacific coast extinguished, to embarrass navigation, and that American telegrams and mail to and from Mexican Pacific ports could not be transmitted.

Representative Dies in the house today advocated the disarming of the "important murderers" of Mexico and placing in their hands the "implements of husbandry." He prophesied that if President Wilson ever closed down his "square jaws on the Mexican situation it will have to thunder several times before he lets go."

WASHINGTON STATE TROOP GETS "FORETASTE" OF WAR

(TACOMA, Wash., May 10.—Eager to see if Troop B of the state guard was prepared for the call, Captain Hartwell W. Palmer ordered the troop to go to American Lake today to mobilize. Grim scenes of preparation were enacted at the armory and "on to Mexico" was in the air. Before noon twenty-five members of the troop were on hand with blankets, tents and canteens ready to start on a moment's notice. Mothers wept on hearing their sons would probably go to war. There was commotion and busy preparations all through the city. Newspapers issued extra and telephone wires were kept hot with orders and inquiries. Captain Palmer explained that the order had been given at a test of the preparedness of the troop.

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
