Exposition Notes.
One of the most important conventions to be held at San Francisco during the Panama-Pacific International exposition, will be the International Engineering Congress, of which the chairman will be Colonel George W. Goethals.
The Danish pavilion at the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco in 1915, will be a reproduction of the Old Castle Kronborg at Elsinore, made famous by Shakespeare as the scene of his tragedy, Hamlet.
Sir Thomas Lipton is building a new yacht to compete for the international cup at the International Yacht races to take place at San Francisco during the Panama-Pacific International exposition. President Woodrow Wilson and King George of England have offered trophies.
Military drill teams from the armies of many nations will be a feature of the military display at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. It is probable that more than 50,000 soldiers will be quartered at the presidio grounds adjoining the exposition site during the summer of 1915.
The tower of jewels, the dominating architectural feature of the Panama-Pacific International exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915, will be covered with hundreds of thousands of iridescent jewels cut from the hardest crystal, and hand polished. These jewels will be hung in such a way that they will tremble and sparkle continually from the natural vibration of the air.
The live stock exhibit at the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco in 1915, at which all the great cattle and stock raising nations will display, will cover sixty-five acres. One hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars has been set aside by the exposition management for premiums and prizes for live stock, and the sum of \$47,000 has been raised by breeders' associations in the United States and abroad.
D. O. Lively, chief of the department of live stock for the Panama-Pacific International exposition, and one of the commissioners sent to South America by the exposition, has returned to San Francisco after an absence of six months. The countries visited by the commission include Venezuela, Brazil, Uruguay, Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, Peru and Panama, each of which has promised substantial representation at the exposition.
Paul Manship, the talented young American sculptor, who recently won the Helen Foster Barrett prize at the winter exhibit of the National Academy of Design, will be represented at the Panama-Pacific International exposition by four vertical groups, "Eternity and Eternance," "Order and Chaos," "Music" and "The Joy of Living." These four groups will stand upon the upper ramps of the sunken garden in the Court of the Universe.
The social economy exhibit in the Palace of Education at the Panama-Pacific International exposition will be an exhaustive international social survey. It will contain a day nursery where children will receive care according to the latest scientific methods, classes of school children illustrating particular systems of education, laboratories where research work and experiments are illustrated and explained, safety devices in industrial operation, and the like.
The loan exhibit to be housed in the Palace of Fine Arts during the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco in 1915 will, without exaggeration, be the greatest art collection ever assembled. The exhibit will include many famous old masterpieces which never before have been shown to the United States and galleries of Europe, where they have been hoarded. The contemporaneous exhibits from the various nations of Europe and the new world will comprise the very best work of all the best modern painters.
