
Huerta Delegates Will Stop in Cuban Capital Few Days



FEDERAL FORCES ARE ABANDONING TAMPICO TO FOE

Evacuation of Oil City by Huerta Garrison Early in Afternoon Reported by Mayo.

LEAVING BY THE RAILROAD

Two Government Gunboats Steam Out of Panuco River.

ANCHOR NEAR FOREIGN SHIPS

Their Action Held to Mean Rebels Ready to Occupy Town.

NEWS BY RELAYED WIRELESS

Galveston Also Hears that Defenders Are in Retreat.

FIGHTING HAS ABOUT CEASED

Heavy Firing Near the Close of Battle Said to Maye Been in Progress-Foreigners Go Aboard Warships.

WASHINGTON, May 13 .- Evacuation of Tampico by the Mexican federal garrison began at 12:50 p. m. today, according to a relayed wireless dispatch to the Navy department from Rear Admiral Mayo. The federal troops were leaving by the railroad.

Rear Admiral Mayo at Tampico reported to the Navy department tonight that at 2 p. m. today the Mexican federal gunboats Brave and Zaragoza eteamed out of the Panuco and anchored near the foreign warships outside.

The gunboats have been the chief support of the garrison and their flight was accepted by naval officers here as meaning that the constitutionalists were about

to occupy the town. That the rebels encountered desperate resistance in their final attack on Tampico and that they were compelled to FIERCE FIGHTING ON TUESDAY carry their fight to the heart of the town was indicated by Rear Admiral Mayo's report. He stated that at I o clock this afternoon, when it was reported the rebels had occupied Tampico,

there was heavy firing in the Plaza and that big gun firing continued. The federals were retreating by way of the railroad leading to San Luis Potosi

held by the constitutionalists. Pedernia Evacuation from Vera Crus received here tonight state that fighting has about ceased at Tampico and the federals are evacuating the city by way of the railroad line. There was said to be heavy firing near the close of the battle.

Junren Henra News. JUAREZ, Mex., May 18.-Word was received by constitutionalist officials here shortly before 7 o'clock that the constitutionalist forces under General Pablo Gonzales were occupying Tampico. No details as to the loss of life or damage to property have been received.

The federal gunboat Bravo began a bombardment of the constitutionalist position on a hill in the outskirts of the city and a school house occupied by the constitutionalists, at 8 o'clock last night. The artillery fire of the gunboat was hadly directed, according to the message, doing no damage and wounding no one in the constitutionalist ranks. On May 10 and 11 General Gonzales, with

his brigadier generals, Luis Caballero and Cessario Castro, took up their positions before Tampico and by a series of reconnoisances and skirmishes located the positions of the federals.

General Gonzales then sent a note to the federal commander, General Morelos Zaragoza, inviting him to leave his position within the city and engage on the plain outs'de in order to avoid needless bloodshed among citizens of the town and noncombatants. This note was communicated to the foreign consuls in Tampico who were notified to see that their fellow countrymen took refuge on vessels in the

General Zaragoza evidently refused to leave his position.

Shelling Plour Mill federal gunboat Zaragona is shellng the Madero flour mill, which is situated on the banks of the Panuco river, and which is occupied by the constitutionalist troops, but the federal infantry remained

in their trenches. Another telegram which was received by way of Ciudad Victoria stated that the famifies of foreigners living in Tampico had taken refuge on warships and merchant vessels in the harbor and that many of the Mexican residents of the city had taken refuge behind the constitution-
